Harris keeps saying hello to good MD-bred runners

William R. Harris lives in Virginia, but for some 50 years his large and successful horse operation has been rooted in Maryland.

Now "past 80 and headed toward 90," and long since retired as the owner of a mechanical contracting firm, Harris Heating, in the Richmond, Va., area, he continues to breed and race Thoroughbreds as avidly as ever.

And why not?

Harris is having the time of his life with Sweet Goodbye, his 5-year-old homebred race mare who went undefeated in her first three starts of this season, all stakes, including the Grade 2 Barbara Fritchie Handicap, for trainer Chris Grove.

So named because her dam, the exceptional stakes producer Thirty Eight Steps, died a few months after she was born, Sweet Goodbye has turned out to be Harris's best runner yet. Champion Maryland-bred 3-year-old filly of 2008, with her victories that season including the Maryland Million Oaks, she has won 10 of 14 career starts (seven stakes wins) and earned \$436,072.

Sweet Goodbye descends from a mare, Amaranth Street (by Up the Ensign), whom Harris purchased off the track at Charles Town in the early 1970s.

Bred to Anticipating, a Bold Ruler son then standing

in Maryland, Amaranth Street produced the stellar performer Amanti, who won or placed in 20 stakes for Harris, earning \$306,981 in the 1980s.

Amanti's racing talent shone through in her offspring, including multiple stakes winner Nawmon (\$276,701) and multiple stakes-placed Quiet Gratitude (\$260,316) and Imadefender (\$113,518).

Then Amanti's unraced daughter Thirty Eight Steps—by longtime Maryland sire Thirty Eight Paces—raised the family to a new level.

Thirty Eight Steps produced four widely accomplished stakes winners, all by stallions standing at Allen and Audrey Murray's Murmur Farm in Darlington, Md., and each campaigned by Harris.

Her first foal, the 1992 Norquestor filly Norstep, won or placed in nine stakes, earning \$229,845.

Until recently, Thirty Eight Steps's best runner was the gelding Deer Run (1997, Deer-

hound), who won the Maryland Million Sprint Handicap and Fire Plug Stakes and had eight additional stakes placings, including a runner-up performance in the Grade 1 Frank J. De Francis Memorial Dash; his earnings totaled \$408,530.

Before this year, her top earner was the gelding Five Steps. A son of Yarrow Brae, Five Steps amassed \$413,746 while winning half of his 20 starts (six stakes wins or placings) before his untimely death two years ago at age 7.

Sweet Goodbye represents the first Maryland crop of her sire, Louis Quatorze. Harris attributes some of her success to the Bold Ruler blood on both sides of her family (Louis Quatorze's sire, Sovereign Dancer, is a grandson of that influential stallion). And he's looking to build on that nick. Sweet Goodbye's winning half-sisters Breezy Bray and Vontay (both by Yarrow Brae) were expecting Louis Quatorze offspring this season. 🐾

Another banner season for Meyerhoff

Robert E. Meyerhoff was named Maryland's Breeder of the Year for 2009—the ninth time that he has received this honor.

No other Maryland breeder in history has compiled a record to equal Meyerhoff, who rose to the fore in 1986 while campaigning homebred Broad Brush and has achieved continuing success with the descendants of that multiple graded-winning millionaire.

In 2009, Meyerhoff's Fitzhugh LLC was represented as a breeder by three stakes winners: Horse of the Year Richard's Kid, Encaustic and Brandon's Oboe.

Hero of the Grade 1 Pacific Classic, Richard's Kid (2005; Lemon Drop Kid—Tough Broad, by Broad Brush) also won the John B. Campbell Handicap at Laurel Park and added stakes placings in the Goodwood Breeders' Cup Stakes-G1 and Cougar II Handicap for season's earnings totaling \$732,840, the most for any Maryland-bred last season.

Broad Brush's son Encaustic (out of Meyerhoff's outstanding producer Illeria, dam of Grade 1-winning millionaire Include) won or placed in six stakes, including victories in the Mountaineer Mile Handicap and Labor Day Stakes, earning \$255,335.

Brandon's Oboe, a son of Lemon Drop Kid and the

Broad Brush daughter Broad Expectations, joined the ranks of stakes winners at age 5 at Marquis Downs in Canada.

In all, horses bred by Fitzhugh won 49 races in 2009, and accounted for \$1,877,721 in earnings.

Richard's Kid's dam, Tough Broad, bred by Meyerhoff and owned for the latter part of her life by Dr. Tom Bowman, earned the Broodmare of the Year title.

Although Richard's Kid is her only stakes performer, Tough Broad has had four winners from five foals to race; three of her offspring have earned more than \$100,000 on the track.

Meyerhoff purchased Tough Broad's dam, Rich-

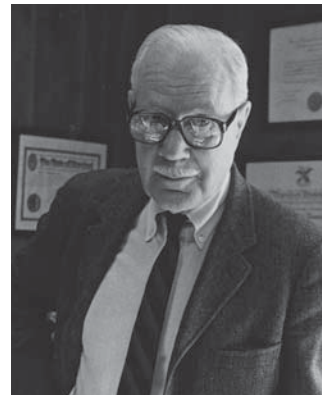
ard's Choice (by Private Account), for \$260,000 at the 1988 Keeneland July Yearling sale.

Herself a multiple stakes winner of \$395,132, Tough Broad died in early 2009 as the result of a pasture injury that also took the life of the Two Punch foal she was carrying at that time.

The MHBA's annual Stallion of the Year award was likewise no surprise.

The venerable Not For Love, a 20-year-old son of Mr. Prospector standing at Northview Stallion Station, took Stallion of the Year honors for the fourth year in a row, and seventh time in his career.

Represented by 16 stakes winners, including graded-winning Maryland-bred

champions Not for Silver and Blind Date, Not For Love repeated his feat of 2008, when he became the first stallion outside of Kentucky to be credited with \$6 million in progeny earnings in a single season. His offspring earned \$6,117,580 in 2009.

Not For Love has ranked as the nation's leading sire standing outside of Kentucky (by North American earnings) for seven consecutive years.



The Tesio Award, presented only when a majority of MHBA board members feels that someone has made an exceptional impact on the industry, is presented this year in recognition of the late Hal C.B. Clagett.

Clagett, who died on February 1 at the age of 93, wrote the legislation that led to the creation of the Maryland-bred Fund in 1962.

A breeder/owner in southern Maryland for more than 60 years, Clagett served three terms as president of the Maryland Horse Breeders Association (1969 to 1971).

He bred and raised five Maryland-bred champions, the most noteworthy being millionaire Little Bold John (champion older male in 1988 and '89). Others were Ameri Valay (sire of 2002 Preakness runner-up Magic Weisner), Carnirainbow, Run Alden and Assault John.

Longtime MHBA employee Gale Shaffer retires

Gale Shaffer, the Maryland Horse Breeders Association's longtime receptionist and registrar, retired on March 31.

During her 20 years with the MHBA, Shaffer fielded countless calls from those seeking information on a wide range of horse-related topics.

"Gale's cheerful and patient manner, along with her wealth of knowledge, was an important asset to the office and to the Maryland breed-

ing industry as a whole," said MHBA executive director Cricket Goodall.

A lifelong Maryland horseperson, Shaffer, 66, grew up riding and showing in Anne Arundel County. She recalls buying her first horse during her senior year in high school, using money she earned by baby sitting and working at the nearby stable in exchange for board.

Shaffer graduated from the Baltimore College of Com-



merce and was employed as an administrative assistant at Alco-Gravure printing company in Glen Burnie until marrying and moving to Carroll County in 1968.

She was a "stay-at-home Mom and farmhand" for some 15 years, breeding and raising

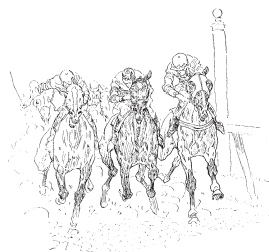
Thoroughbreds while her then husband, David Shaffer, kept Appaloosas.

Although Gale bred for the race track, the best horse to come off of her farm was steeplechase star Treasure Island, who won the 1983 Grand National at Butler.

In 1985, Shaffer rejoined the indoor work force, with a job as bookkeeper and administrative assistant at David and JoAnn Hayden's Dark Hollow Farm in Upperco, where she remained until being hired at the MHBA in February 1990.

Two years later, she became the MHBA's Maryland Fund registrar.

Shaffer lives on a 10-acre farm in Carroll County with several "geriatric horses, a dog and an assortment of barn cats." She has two children, three grandchildren and three great-grandchildren. 🐾

Bet down to 1-5 favoritism for the Conniver Stakes against Maryland-bred fillies and mares on March 13 at Laurel Park, the ultra-consistent Sweet Goodbye delivered as expected under regular rider J.D. Acosta.

Responding easily to the challenge, she opened up a commanding lead in mid-stretch and prevailed by two and a quarter lengths over 35-1 longshot Call of a Lion.

It was the third stakes win in as many months for the 5-year-old mare, who had

run the race of her life to win her previous outing, Laurel's Grade 2 Barbara Fritchie Handicap on February 15.

Campaigning for breeder William R. Harris (see article on page 1 of this newsletter), Sweet Goodbye has ranked among the top Maryland-breds in her division in each of the last three seasons, and was honored as champion Maryland-bred 3-year-old filly of 2008.

But the Chris Grove trainee has reached a new level in 2010. She annexed the six-fur-

long What a Summer Stakes by a length against open company on January 9—a race that proved an ideal set-up for the seven-furlong Barbara Fritchie, in which she closed with determination to outfinish runner-up Pamona Ball by a head.

Five rivals, including the 2009 champion Maryland-bred older female, All Giving, lined up against Sweet Goodbye in the Conniver. Sharing high weight of 124 pounds with All Giving, Sweet Goodbye gave four to six pounds

to each of the others, and stopped the timer after seven furlongs in 1:23.85 over a sloppy, sealed track.

All Giving, at odds of 5.2-1 gave way to finish third, four

lengths behind Call of a Lion. Next were Sterling Vow, Fascinating Rhythm and Lori Z's Punch (who showed the way through the first quarter mile and was eased in the stretch).

From the first Maryland-sired crop of 1996 Preakness winner Louis Quatorze, who stands at Allen and Audrey Murray's Murmur Farm in Darlington, Sweet Goodbye

has won 10 of her 14 career starts, including seven stakes victories. Her earnings so far this season—\$174,000—have boosted her career total to \$436,072.

All Giving romps in Primonetta Stakes

All Giving, the champion Maryland-bred older mare of 2009, returned to her winning ways with a galloping victory in the \$70,000 Primonetta Stakes at Laurel Park on April 3. Owned by Concepts Unlimited Stable and Catherine J. Smith, All Giving was winning for the seventh time at Laurel. Her most recent victory came in the Maryland Million Distaff Handicap in September.

In the Primonetta, the 6-year-old daughter of Allen's Prospect carried Horacio Karamanos to a two and three-quarter-length victory in 1:09.55 for the six furlongs over a fast main track. She had prepped for this start with a third place finish in the seven-furlong Conniver Stakes in March.

"Last time she needed the race," said Karamanos. "She

broke sharp out of the gate and put herself into striking position nice and easy. I just waited for the moment and after the three-eighths pole I put her outside to give me a run to the finish. She's come back to be the same strong horse."

All Giving stalked the pacemakers into deep stretch before driving to the lead a furlong from the finish line. Next best was Streetscape, with long-shot speedster What Time It Is holding on to be third.

As Maryland-breds, the first and third finishers earned proportionate shares of the \$20,000 purse bonus provided by the Maryland Fund, and added to the base purse of \$50,000.

"She's come back really well this year," said trainer Flint Stites. "The plan was to run her in an allowance race before we started her campaign this year but unfortunately we couldn't find that

race. We had to run her last time. It was a little too far and this time she was back in her wheelhouse where she's much more comfortable going three-quarters."

All Giving, bred by Morris E. Balsler's Baywood LLC, now has seven stakes victories on her resume. Her career record is 39-14-6-5 and earnings of \$555,685.

Indian Dance captures Harrison E. Johnson Memorial

Sondra and Howard Bender's homebred Indian Dance was methodical in victory as the overwhelming race favorite, rallying from just off the pace to win the \$70,000 Harrison E. Johnson Memorial Stakes for older horses on March 27 at Laurel Park.

Sent to post as the 3-5 favorite under Luis Garcia, the gelded son of Indian Charlie beat four others in the nine-furlong test, completing the distance in 1:51.04 and winning by two lengths. Zarroc edged Eddie C. by a neck to finish second.

The base purse for the Harrison Johnson was \$50,000. As a Maryland-bred, Indian Dance earned a portion of a \$20,000 purse enhancement provided by the Maryland Fund.

"Even though this wasn't a tough race on paper, it was difficult," Garcia said. "They were walking up front and he was dragging me. He went to the lead too soon which he doesn't like—he wants a target in front. He ran really green today but he still won for fun."

In his previous start, the 4-year-old trained by Larry Murray rallied in the same manner to finish a game second in the John B. Campbell Handicap on February 15.

"The lack of competition seemed to make him lackadaisical," Murray said. "I was a little concerned Luis was going to make the lead too early and he didn't finish as well as he usually does but he is still learning. I have no complaints. He is a nice horse."

Indian Dance is now 4-for-6 lifetime with earnings of \$107,575.

Indian Dance comes from a long-established family at the Benders' Glade Valley Farms in Frederick, Md. His dam, the unraced Darlin's Band (by Dixieland Band), is a half-sister to Green Darlin (by Green Dancer), who carried the Benders' silks to victory in the Delaware Handicap-G2. Green Darlin is also the dam of Bender-bred stakes winner Dancin Rahy.

Among Maryland's premier breeder/owners of the last several decades, the Benders purchased Indian Dance's second dam, Al's Darlin (by Alydar) for \$400,000 at the 1985 Keeneland July Yearling sale.

Gov. O'Malley Requests USDA Secretarial Disaster Designation to help farmers recover

Governor Martin O'Malley has requested that U.S. Department of Agriculture Secretary Tom Vilsack issue a Secretarial Disaster Designation as a result of agricultural damage sustained during the historic snow storms in February. The Governor has requested that all Maryland counties that meet the threshold for the designation be included in the designation so that producers may receive assistance that becomes available.

"Maryland agricultural producers experienced excessive losses of structures, equipment, crops—including nursery crops—and livestock as a result of the blizzards in February," said Gov. O'Malley. "We want to make sure that we've done everything we can

to see that all available assistance is triggered. On behalf of Maryland farmers, I thank Sec. Vilsack for acting quickly upon this request so that appropriate relief can be made available to eligible producers."

Through its assessments, the Maryland State Office of the USDA Farm Service Agency (FSA) has indicated that individual farm operations in 16 of the state's 23 counties sustained excessive damage and in some cases total losses of livestock, structures, crops and equipment. Counties that FSA has identified are Garrett, Allegany, Washington, Frederick, Howard, Montgomery, Prince George's Anne Arundel, Harford, Cecil, Queen Anne's, Caroline, Dorchester,

Reminder: Equine Census forms due June 1

The deadline for submitting forms for the 2010 Maryland Equine Census is June 1.

The U.S. Department of Agriculture's National Agricultural Statistics Service has mailed out more than 21,000 forms to equine owners and stable operators to collect information on Maryland's equine industry for the 2009 calendar year.

"It is important that everyone who receives a questionnaire respond. Whether you own a single horse for your family's recreational use or run a large breeding or training facility, we need your input," said Jim Steele, the chairman of the Maryland Horse Industry Board

and manager of Shamrock Farms in Woodbine. "Anyone concerned about submitting personal or financial information should know that by law, all such information is strictly confidential."

The census is the only reliable measure of the size and economic impact of the industry for public and private decision making process. Anyone involved in equine activities who does not receive a questionnaire is asked to call (800) 675-0295 (toll free) to request a questionnaire.

Wicomico, Worcester and Somerset. If the designation is made, all adjacent counties are automatically included. FSA estimates damage at almost \$10 million.

A disaster designation would make low interest loans and revenue assistance avail-
