Cary Jackson retires grand champion trophy at MHBA Yearling Show

The only thing hotter than the summer of 2010 are the yearlings that longtime Maryland breeder Cary W. Jackson brings to the Maryland Horse Breeders Association's annual show.

When Aiken, S.C.-based bloodstock agent Cary Frommer, this year's judge for the 76th Yearling Show held on June 27 at the fairgrounds in Timonium, selected Jackson's Langfuhr colt as grand champion, it was the third time in the last six editions of the show that the top prize was taken by a Jackson homebred. As a result, Jackson gained permanent possession of the Chanceland Farm Challenge Trophy, which was donated by Robert T. Manfuso in 2000, following his third win.

Frommer described Jackson's champion colt as a "lovely, elegant individual—balanced and athletic." Out of the stakes-winning Regal Intention mare Millashand, the chestnut colt, who is a March 10 foal, topped 15 entries in Class III for out-of-state-sired colts and geldings.

Jackson, who maintains a select broodmare band at his Foxharbor Farm in White Hall, won consecutive grand championships in 2005 and

'06. Judge Ben Perkins Sr. pinned Bianchi's Boy, a future stakes-placed colt by Cryptoclearance—Lady Tiara, by Vice Regent, and a year later judge Tim Ritchey selected a colt by Louis Quatorze—Carna, by Dehere. In 2007 and 2008, Jackson's yearlings, both out of Lady Tiara, just missed the top prize, each taking home reserve championship trophies.

With temperatures hovering near the triple-digit mark, the 2010 yearling show was a

test of stamina for both yearlings and their handlers. Six classes were judged, with a total of 61 exhibited.

Reserve champion honors went to Marilyn and George Doetsch's homebred Fantastecat filly out of Dingle Dandy, by Conquistador Cielo. Frommer described the filly, named Fridays Gift, as "very pretty and elegant, with a great walk."

It was a busy weekend for the Doetsches, who hosted the Yearling Show Crab Feast at

their Marama Farm in Clarks-ville the evening prior to the show.

The reserve champion, who took first place among nine entries in Class IV for Maryland-sired fillies foaled prior to March 20, was one of two class winners for Fantastecat, a son of Storm Cat standing as property of Maryland Stallion Station at Bonita Farm in Darlington. The other was the Class V winner, a filly out of Love Me Twice, by Not For Love. From the family of 2010 multiple stakes winner Baltimore Bob, the filly born on April 22 was bred and shown by Carol Kaye-Garcia.

Fantastecat took the Northview Stallion Station Challenge Trophy presented for the show's leading sire.

Kaye-Garcia had a successful day right out of the gate. Her yearling colts took the top two placements in Class I. Awarded the blue ribbon was a son of Great Notion out of the King of Kings (Ire) mare Happy Sylvia, a half-sister to stakes winner Sadler's Sarah.

Taking second place was a Seeking Daylight colt out of 2001 class winner Alpine Cat (by Forest Wildcat).

Winner of Class II was a son of Maryland's leading sire Not For Love. The first foal out of the Polish Numbers mare Hurricane Hazel, the colt born on April 22 is owned and bred by Margaret and John Crane.

Longtime show participants Bob Manfuso and Katy Voss exhibited the Class VI winner, a chestnut filly by Mr. Sekiguchi out of the graded stakes-placed mare Waltz (by Pleasant Tap). It was the 21st class won by a Manfuso yearling (owned solely or in partnership) since 1992.

A total of \$11,100 in prize money was awarded on the day of the show. And every yearling who participated is now eligible for the \$40,000 yearling show premium, which will be divided and distributed among the top four leading earners competing at ages 2 and 3.

Winners of this year's amateur judging contest, in which spectators attempt to match the judge's selections for Class IV, were Cathy Degges and Henry Walters.

"We also receive substantial support from Maryland owner/breeder Milton Higgins and from the MHBA's charitable arm, the Maryland

Horse Industry Foundation, and other major donors."

Anyone attending college this fall, and employed during the past year at a Maryland farm, veterinary clinic, training center or backstretch, is invited to apply for a scholarship.

Deadline for submitting applications is September 23.

George Brown Bowl presented to Private Attack

The George Brown Bowl, presented since 1985 to the timber horse judged to have had the best performance over the five Maryland spring sanctioned races at the My Lady's Manor, Maryland Grand National and Maryland Hunt Cup, went this year to Private Attack.

Private Attack finished second in both the Grand National and Hunt Cup. He is owned by Sportsman's Hall, a partnership of Julie Colhoun, Dan Colhoun III and Jeffrey Schlesinger. Trained by Alicia Murphy, Private Attack was

ridden in both races by Mark Beecher, who traveled from Ireland.

Past winners of the George Brown Bowl include such illustrious performers as Von Csadek, Buck Jakes, Florida Law and Welter Weight.

George Brown was a Maryland sportsman of the late 1800s and early 1900s. He rode in the Maryland Hunt Cup 14 times over a span of 28 years, winning in 1900 and 1916. He was a Master of the Green Spring Hounds and a steward at tracks in Maryland, Delaware and Florida.

Roaring Lion wins two stakes in a row at Monmouth Park

Repole Stable's Roaring Lion won his second straight stakes at Monmouth Park on August 1, rallying outside on the turn and then rolling to finish a length and a half in front of He's So Chic in the \$150,000 Teddy Drone Stakes.

On July 5, Roaring Lion reeled in pacesetter Unwritten and held off the charge of Wildcat Brief to capture the \$100,000 Mr. Prospector Stakes by a nose.

Trained by Bruce Levine, Roaring Lion, a 6-year-old by Lion Hearted out of the Horatius mare Smartly, won last year's Maryland Million Sprint and is likely to be among the favorites on this year's 25th annual Jim McKay Maryland Million Day on October 2 at Laurel Park.

He has won 11 of his 28 career starts, with four stakes wins, and boasts earnings of \$481,870.

Roaring Lion was bred by Buckingham Farm, the Ches-

tertown, Md., establishment of Elizabeth (Binnie) Houghton and her late husband, Edward (Eddie) Houghton.

Like many of the Buckingham horses, his family traces back generations at that farm. Smartly was bred in the name of Mill House, the nom de course of Binnie Houghton's cousin, former U.S. Treasury Secretary Nicholas F. Brady, and his family. Herself a stakes winner, Smartly (\$172,327, Sham Say S, etc.) produced Roaring Lion as her sixth foal

and so far her only stakes performer.

Roaring Lion launched his career for the Houghtons and trainer Richard W. Small, for whom he won the 2006 Maryland Juvenile Championship Stakes. He was claimed from his original connections in November 2007, his first time in for a tag, at Philadelphia Park for \$25,000.

Repole Stable belongs to Michael Repole, founder of Glaceau, the company that produces Vitaminwater.

WHAT IS MHBA'S PAC?

It is a **political action committee** formed by the Maryland Horse Breeders Association. The PAC solicits voluntary contributions from individuals or corporations to support issues or assist selected candidates for public office in the state of Maryland who are interested in the problems of our industry and are willing to help us solve those problems.

WHY DO WE NEED PAC?

The largest market for horses bred in Maryland is horse racing, an industry which is closely regulated by state government. In addition, while not well understood, horse breeding is an especially important segment of Maryland agriculture. The economic well-being of racing and breeding is very much a function of the political process. It is essential to the health of our industry that we educate our elected official and support those who work with us on issues vital to our interests.

HOW DOES PAC WORK?

The PAC receives voluntary contributions through its treasurer which are then disbursed to candidates or spent supporting issues as selected by a committee headed by the chairperson of the MHBA Legislative Committee. Any administrative expense will be paid by the MHBA. Reports of PAC contributions must be filed with the State Administrative Board of Election Laws and are a matter of public record.

WHAT ARE THE LAWS GOVERNING CAMPAIGN CONTRIBUTIONS?

No corporation or individual may give more than \$4,000 to a single candidate or more than \$10,000 to all candidates in any given four-year election cycle. Any contribution to the PAC must be included in your \$10,000 total for an election.

WHAT IS THE TAX STATUS OF MY CONTRIBUTION?

There are no deductions or credits allowed on your state tax returns but federal law permits a credit of 50 percent on total political contributions up to a \$50 credit (for a \$100 contribution) on individual returns, and a \$100 credit (for a \$200 contribution) on joint returns. Political contributions are not deductible business expenses.
