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MHBA Board of Directors election

Two first-time elected board members, Michael J. Harrison DVM and R. Larry Johnson, and incumbents Donald Barr, James T. Dresher Jr. and Milton Higgins III were the top vote-getters of Maryland Horse Breeders Association breeder-owner members in the annual election to fill five positions on the 15-member board.

The results were announced on May 25 at the MHBA's annual meeting, held at the Baltimore County Center for Maryland Agriculture in Hunt Valley.

Harrison and Johnson are longtime members of the MHBA. Harrison, 59, an equine veterinarian who has owned and operated Willowdale Farm in Butler (Baltimore County) since 1983, was a presidential appointee to the Board of Directors in 2010. A member of the American Veterinary Medical Association and American Association of Equine Practitioners, among others, Harrison and wife Beth own about 20 horses. A member of the MHBA since 1982, Harrison bred and owned stakes winner Sassy Love.

Johnson, of Legacy Farm in Bluemont, Va., has had many good runners in Maryland, including multiple stakes win-

ner Two Smart, and currently stands homebred Street Magician at stud at Northview Stallion Station in Chesapeake City, Md. A 64-year-old certified public accountant specializing in forensic accounting, Johnson joined the MHBA in 1993. He has a stable of approximately 30 broodmares, 25 race horses and 25 younger horses.

New Market (Frederick County) resident Barr, a trainer for more than 40 years, was first elected to the board in 2010 to fill a vacancy. Also a member of the board of the Maryland Horsemen's Assistance Fund, Barr has served on the Virginia Racing Commission's medication com-

mittee. The 70-year-old trainer, who has operated Gray Swan Farm since 2003 and has trained such standouts as Ravalo, Who Wouldn't and Purple Passion, noted on this year's ballot that his goals are to "make the Maryland Fund more competitive with surrounding states by increasing bonuses to breeders and adding state-bred restricted races to the program."

Dresher is elected to his second three-year term, having joined the board in 2008. A resident of Bel Air (Harford County), Dresher and wife Patti own and operate Oakfield Farm and own five broodmares and nearly a dozen other horses, including

four of racing age. Dresher's Huckleberry Farm has bred the likes of Maryland Million Distaff winner Merryland Missy. The founder and CEO of Skye Hospitality LLC who builds, owns and manages hotels in the Baltimore area, Dresher has set among his goals for the MHBA, in part, to "work to (1) increase Maryland-bred 'preferred' programs at Maryland race tracks; (2) attract new owners; (3) partner with race

track ownership and other Maryland horseman's groups to protect our share of the Maryland slots program; (4) develop ways to market our great story to others more effectively."

Higgins, 73, first elected to the MHBA board in 2008 and the MHBA's secretary/treasurer the past two years, is a longtime partner with Dr. and Mrs. Thomas Bowman and has bred numerous top Maryland runners, including 2010

Maryland-bred champion 3-year-old Not Abroad. A former business consultant with an MBA from Harvard University Business School, Higgins owns five broodmares, approximately five stallion shares, horses of racing age and young horses. Among Higgins's visions for the MHBA is "to safeguard the financial viability of the MHBA as an organization, while trying to maximize bonuses and supplements to our stake-

holders, in particular Maryland breeders."

Mike Pons and Frank Wright leave the board, term limits making them ineligible for reelection. Pons has served the maximum six three-year terms as a board member and received recognition at the meeting for his contributions to the MHBA. Wright completed his sixth consecutive year as a board member and is required to take one year off. 🐾

For the Haydens, Safely Kept a 'famed' product of rejection

Safely Kept's storied career, breeder David Hayden implied, her 17 straight stakes victories against fillies, then-unprecedented \$2 million in sprint earnings and recent election to the National Museum of Racing's Hall of Fame only happened because Charlie McGinnes said no.

It was 1985. David and JoAnn Hayden of Dark Hollow Farm in Upperco were rather new to racing and breeding. Horatius, among the Mid-Atlantic's preeminent sires, was standing at McGinnes's Thornmar Farm in Chestertown.

The Haydens sent one of their few broodmares to Horatius, but her breeding-shed histrionics prompted McGinnes to eject her; he worried she might hurt the prize stallion or someone else.

The Haydens consulted a short list of established broodmares they might send as a replacement. Safely Home (Winning Hit—Arc Lamp, by *Stella Aurata), a mare they'd claimed at Bowie Race Track for \$11,500, had produced two Double Zeus foals, had a Hail Emperor filly by her side, and was next in the breeding cue. Off she went.

On April 7, 1986, Safely Home delivered Safely Kept.

But horse-racing folklore will hold that the filly sired by Horatius is out of unintended consequences.

"You can make grand plans in this business, but there's only so much you can control," JoAnn Hayden said by cell phone after driving to their second farm, the one they named Safely Home.

"The horse or the situation or the timing of the event makes it happen or not happen."

The tale of Safely Kept kept getting sweeter. The Haydens tried to sell her off the farm as a weanling, asking \$5,000. One interested party came by for a look and openly disparaged the unreasonable price.

Physically precocious with a magnificent hip and shoulder, Safely Kept nonetheless was not among the top five finishers in her class at the 1987 Maryland Horse Breeders Association Yearling Show.

But, by the end of 1988, she started catching glances. Her dazzling turn of foot and victory in the Playpen Stakes prompted an exchange between the Haydens and horse owner Barry Weisbord. Negotiations brief and amicable, the Haydens sold Safely Kept to Weisbord and Richard Santulli's Jayeff B Stable for \$300,000. The filly remained with trainer Carlos Garcia for a time, winning the Smart Angle Stakes, then moved to Alan Goldberg's barn in New Jersey.

When her racing career ended in 1991, Safely Kept had a record of 31-24-2-3 over four seasons, an Eclipse Award sprint title (1989), two straight Maryland-bred Horse of the Year titles (1989-90) and the now-iconic 1990 Breeders' Cup Sprint-G1 victory after front-running Dayjur jumped a shadow in deep stretch.

At 2, Safely Kept won two stakes; at 3, eight stakes (four graded), including the Grade 1 Test, and just missed to

Dancing Spree in the Breeders' Cup Sprint-G1; at 4, seven stakes (five graded), the Breeders' Cup Sprint among them; at 5, five stakes (three graded).

How deep was her legend? She was favored 27 times and assigned 130 pounds for the 1991 Maryland Million Distaff Handicap, which she won (for a third time).

In the whole of Thoroughbred racing, no North American sprinter had retired with \$2 million in purses. Safely Kept earned \$2,194,206.

She will be enshrined in the Hall of Fame on August 12, the ceremony scheduled for the Fasig-Tipton sales pavilion in Saratoga Springs, N.Y. The Haydens will be there.

Trainer Jerry Hollendorfer and the fillies Open Mind and Sky Beauty also will be inducted.

David Hayden marveled at the scope of it. Sure, Safely Kept's Hall of Fame nod seemed well overdue. Then again, Safely Kept herself grew out of a disappointing \$11,500 claim.

Ron Alfano, then a perennial training leader in Maryland, knew that Safely Home liked Pimlico, so he claimed

her out of a race at Bowie early in 1980 with Baltimore in mind. But the plan went haywire when, in her next and only start for the Haydens, Safely Home injured a tendon and said goodbye to racing with a 73-16-13-12 record and \$83,058 in purses.

"At that time," David Hayden said, "I didn't know what a broodmare was."

The Haydens sent Safely Home to Jolly Johu, Jack and Gretchen Moberley's runner-turned-stallion, without success. Jack told David that the mare was still feeling the effects of a racing regimen, the information conveyed with typical Moberley drollness.

"Jack said, 'I really hate to charge you board,'" David said. "She's the best teaser I ever had." Safely Home apparently had been busy mounting mares in the field.

But the Haydens learned quickly. Booked in successive seasons to Double Zeus, Safely Home produced the colt Safe On Second, whose earnings totaled \$221,220, and Safe At the Plate, a seven-time stakes-placed filly who amassed \$114,923.

After Safely Kept, Safely Home's foals included Part-

ner's Hero (by Danzig), a stakes winner of \$554,731 now standing in Pennsylvania.

Safely Home was euthanized in 1999 at Dark Hollow at age 26. Safely Kept, relieved of broodmare duties last year, is a 25-year-old pensioner at Burleson Farms in Kentucky. She produced 10 foals, has eight winners from as many starters, and two stakes winners: Contrast (by Unbridled) and Peace Chant (by War Chant), both graded stakes-placed.

David Hayden, who founded David Hayden Advertising in 1967, planned to retire and shutter the business at the end of June. Their Thoroughbred holdings now vast and formidable, he and JoAnn will focus even more on this inexplicable life with horses. 🐾

Safely Kept joins five other Maryland-breds in the Hall of Fame—Chalcedon (inducted in 1977), Cigar (2002), Elkridge (1966), Gallorette (1962) and Jay Trump (1971).

Meyerhoff, Not For Love, Tough Broad repeat as Maryland's breeder, stallion and broodmare of the year

Three Maryland standouts are back in the limelight as Maryland's breeder, stallion and broodmare of the year for 2010: Robert E. Meyerhoff, Not For Love and Tough Broad.

This is the 10th such honor for Meyerhoff, whose Fitzhugh LLC bred 2009/2010 Maryland-bred Horse of the Year Richard's Kid, a multiple Grade 1-winning millionaire.

Meyerhoff was represented by an additional stakes win-

ner, Encaustic, in 2010. Together, horses bred in his name and Fitzhugh LLC's won 51 of 344 starts and earned \$1,966,289.

Tough Broad (now deceased) earned her broodmare of the year title as the dam of Richard's Kid. Herself a stakes-winning Meyerhoff homebred, she was a daughter of Meyerhoff's all-time star performer Broad Brush and the Private Account mare Richard's Choice, whom Meyerhoff purchased for \$260,000

at the 1988 Keeneland July Yearling sale.

Not For Love, Maryland's perennial leading sire, has ranked as the nation's leading sire standing outside of Kentucky (by North American earnings) for eight consecutive years. His 2010 progeny earnings totaled \$4,932,820, and he was represented by five stakes winners, with his top earner being Love That Dance (\$241,450). 🐾



Howard's 70-year career reflects hands-on acumen

From the time he was 11, Donald Howard says, he “had an idea” much of his life would be dedicated to horses.

At 81, his inclination has proven true.

For the past 70 years, Donald has groomed horses,

cleaned tack and mucked stalls for many Maryland Thoroughbreds, including 10 Maryland Hunt Cup win-

ners: Fluctuate (1959, '60), Jay Trump ('63, '64, '66), Early Earner ('72), *Ben Nevis II ('77, '78), *Dosdi ('79), Sugar Bee ('87), Ivory Poacher ('93), Buck Jakes ('95), Swayo (2000, '03), and Askim (NZ) ('08).

“The most important thing would have been the horses,” Donald says of his legacy, “and the people too.”

As a child, Donald followed his father, Landy Howard, on weekend jobs, helping hold ponies for kids to mount and ride. Such legendary Maryland steeplechase jockeys as Tommy Smith, Mikey and Paddy Smithwick, Jay Griswold, Tom Voss and Joe Davies can recall Donald's involvement in fox-hunting, point-to-points and pony racing.

As Donald once described, “Horse people were in my blood.”

In addition to his father, Donald's grandfathers, Harry Madden and Joe Howard, earned their living with horses. Victimized by the Depression, Harry and Joe sought work in the Worthington Valley, ultimately on the Fenwick farm. There they mowed, mended fences, oversaw the horses and tended the family garden, a three-acre plot that fed all seven Fenwicks, their employees and their families. Charles C. (Cuppy) Fenwick Sr., who grew up on the farm while Harry and Joe worked there, recalls what “wonderful people” both men were, “of whom I know no equal.”

Donald partnered with his uncle, Herb Madden, for his first job, working on H.R. (Bobby) Fenwick's farm in Butler. Donald worked in the stalls, drove the van and helped Herb groom the horses. Later, he left to work on Cuppy Fenwick's farm, grooming and turning out horses. For 63 years, Donald has been employed by the Fenwick family, tending horses, cleaning tack and working in the barn.

When Donald first worked on Cuppy Fenwick's farm, Charlie Fenwick, then a teenager at the cusp of his riding career, says he and younger brother Bruce looked to Don-

ald as something of an oracle. "At our age," Charlie says, "he seemed to know a whole lot about horses . . . a lot more than we did."

Donald shared his knowledge with both teenage boys on car trips to Virginia for the Middleburg point-to-point races that launched their riding careers.

Describing his role, Donald says a groom's most important tasks are to "clip, pull the mane, put the bridle and saddle on right, and put on the timber bandages."

His earliest memory involves Bobby Fenwick's horse, Fluctuate. Working in tandem, Donald and Herb prepped the horse and cooled him out after races.

"Before the race, I would bandage [Fluctuate's] back legs, while Herb bandaged the front," Donald says.

The most thrilling moment was watching his early charge win his first Maryland Hunt Cup, in 1959. Trained by Bobby Fenwick, Green Spring's Master of Fox Hounds who used him as his own hunter, Fluctuate also won the 1960 Hunt Cup in 8:43½, breaking Blockade's 22-year record.

High on a hill above the course, his favorite vantage point for the race, Donald watched nine more horses capture a Hunt Cup. After 70 years, each resonates for him in different ways.

Early Earner, the 1972 winner, epitomized the unpredictability and challenge of the race. Under trainer Bobby Fenwick, Donald helped in the early days of training by holding the lunge line while the horse learned to jump. Early Earner was sold to Duck Martin, who later piloted him to victory in the Maryland Hunt Cup. However, this did not come without trial.

In the Grand National and another Hunt Cup prep, Early Earner fell at the first and second fences, respectively. Martin observed that Early Earner seemed distracted during the Grand National as the field looped around his barn. When they put blinkers on him, he stopped falling and, a year

later, cleared the Hunt Cup's 22 fences and strode to a first-place finish.

Maryland steeplechasing is rife with colorful stories like Early Earner's ultimate victory, and Donald savors his exposure to many.

One of the most legendary horses Donald handled was also the toughest. *Ben Nevis, who, under Charlie Fenwick, captured two Hunt Cups and the elusive English Grand National at Aintree in 1980, was notoriously difficult to take to the paddock. Given *Ben Nevis's delight at dragging anyone meant to hold him, the determination was made to limit his paddock time.

It often fell to Donald to lead *Ben Nevis around the paddock, with the help of Nipper, trainer Ann Stewart's hunter. Donald and *Ben Nevis had developed a relationship working on the Fenwick farm.

Charlie Fenwick notes, "Donald was very observant with horses." Recognizing that *Ben Nevis had a sweet tooth and an affinity for Red Man chewing tobacco, Donald tucked tins of Red Man in his back pocket or hid them in hay. Often, the gelding could be found tugging at his pants or rooting through straw. This game solidified the unique re-

lationship between horse and groom.

Professionally, Donald made paths for horses, and they for him. Seeking a second career outside racing as a younger man, Donald got no response from several applications for work for Baltimore County. He appealed to Senator Danny Brewster, a Democrat and former steeplechase jockey for whom Donald had done farm work. Through Brewster, Donald got a job with the county's Department of Public Works.

For 25 years, Donald had a job on the highway crew doing roadwork, mowing and plowing; the full-time schedule left him only nights and weekends to devote to horses. But the flame endured.

Charlie Fenwick Jr.'s daughter, Beth Fenwick Garner, recalls a particularly heavy snowstorm that had Donald plowing roads through the night. Despite the long hours, Donald still appeared at the barn the next morning to tend the horses.

"He had a certain level of dedication to his work and a strong work ethic," notes Garner.

Perhaps this stems from Donald's military service. He served two years as an army corporal, then eight years in

the reserves. His tireless labors both with the county and horses supported Ethel, his wife of more than 50 years, and his seven children.

Today, Donald remains a fixture in the horse world, tracking the fox hunt through the Worthington Valley, where he's lived exclusively. He devotes much of his work with horses to younger riders, helping at pony races and cleaning tack. He tends to his flock of chickens and ducks, enjoying annual trips to the Westminster livestock auctions, priding himself on careful selections. When possible, he likes to troll Baltimore County's best fishing holes and "sit on my little bucket and relax."

On such quiet days spent with his fishing rod, Donald can reflect on his 70-year career. "As a groom, I groomed more Maryland Hunt Cup horses than any groom there is," he says. "I don't think a lot of people thought that was important . . . but it was important to me."

A quiet and gentle man, Donald is known for his great sense of humor and wonderful attitude toward life. These traits, and his strong work ethic, have sustained his remarkable career with some of Maryland's finest horses. 🐾

Maryland-bred 2-year-olds bring six figures at auction this spring

Two Maryland-bred fillies were among the top prices on the second day of the Fasig-Tipton Midlantic 2-year-olds in training sale on May 24. Irish Exchange, a daughter of Exchange Rate bred by At Last Farm out of the Silver Deputy mare Silver N Satin, was purchased by Limestone Racing LLC for \$160,000.

Sold by Niall Brennan Stables, agent X, the filly is a half-sister to stakes winner Sterling Vow, from the family of millionaire Candid Glen. She had been sold as a weanling at the Keeneland November sale in 2009 for \$40,000.

Mountain View Sales LLC, agent, sold a Tapit filly for \$140,000 to agent Tom McGreevy bidding on behalf of Fox Hill Farm.

Out of the Polish Numbers mare See Jane, the dark bay bred by Finale Farms and Mr. and Mrs. D. David Moose is a half-sister to stakes winner Munificence and descends from a family of talented runners that includes Proud Run, Wood So and Merry Princess. The See Jane filly also sold as a weanling at Keeneland, bringing \$105,000.

The late Maryland sire Polish Numbers was the brood-

mare sire of a second six-figure juvenile at the May sale, a \$280,000 filly sold by Eisaman Equine, agent. Purchased by Mathis Stables LLC, the dark bay daughter of Street Sense, foaled in Kentucky, is out of Polish Nana, a half-sister to stakes winners Love of Money and Astrid.

A total of eight state-bred juveniles sold at the two-day sale in Timonium, for an average of \$61,312, well above the sale's average of \$47,263.

The Ocala Breeders' Sales Company's Spring sale of 2-year-olds in training held April 18 through 21 in Ocala,

Fla., saw a Maryland-bred colt by Lemon Drop Kid sell for \$140,000.

Bred by Dark Hollow Farm, Mr. and Mrs. Dorsey Brown and Arnold Davidov, the dark bay colt is out of the Pleasant Tap mare Touchnow (\$388,236, Bison City S, etc.). Consigned by Niall Brennan Stables, agent XXV, the colt was purchased by Earle I. Mack, with Arc Bloodstock as agent.

The colt's second dam is stakes winner and stakes producer Now Dance (by Sovereign Dancer). ❧

Private Attack is Maryland's top timber horse for second year in a row

Sportsman Hall's Private Attack, winner of this year's Maryland Hunt Cup and Grand National, has been awarded the George Brown Bowl for a second consecutive year. The George Brown Bowl has been presented since 1985 to the timber horse judged to have had the best performance at the five Maryland spring sanctioned races run at My Lady's Manor, Grand National and Maryland Hunt Cup. Past winners of the award include Von Csadek, Buck Jakes, Florida Law and Welter Weight.

One of only four horses to capture the Grand National and Hunt Cup in the same

season over the last 26 years, 12-year-old Private Attack is trained by Alicia Murphy and was ridden in both races by Blythe Miller Davies. He competes for the partnership of Julie Colhoun, Dan Colhoun III and Jeffrey Schlesinger.

The George Brown Bowl is named for the Maryland sportsman of the late 1800s and early 1900s who rode in the Maryland Hunt Cup 14 times over 28 years, winning the famed timber test in 1900 and 1916. A master of the Green Spring Hounds, Brown was a longtime steward at race tracks in Maryland, Delaware and Florida. ❧



Preakness week starter handicaps for Maryland-breds

Undercards on both Preakness Stakes-G1 and Black-Eyed Susan Stakes-G2 days at Pimlico included a \$25,000 starter handicap restricted to Maryland-breds.

Kattegat's Pride Starter Handicap

Owner/trainer John E. Salzman Jr.'s Silver Partner slipped through a narrow gap between horses at the top of the stretch and drove to victory in the \$25,000 Kattegat's Pride Starter Handicap for fillies and mares on May 20.

Under jockey Ramon Dominguez, the daughter of Partner's Hero reached the finish line two lengths ahead of Universal Language, with long shot Lady Outflanker finishing third. Silver Partner completed the mile and a sixteenth in 1:46.84 and paid \$6.20. Also in the field of eight were (in order of finish) Favored Lady, Franklin's Philly, Danced All Night, Our Jaks and Signofspring.

It was the third win of the year for Silver Partner. "I thought I had a good shot here. I was happy with the move from turf to dirt [her two prior starts having been on the grass] and having Ramon Dominguez helped. He's one of the best riders in the country," said Salzman. "I still want to try the turf with her. With the wet spring, she's never really had a shot here, but we're very pleased with her race today."

Bred by Yigal Rappaport, the 5-year-old mare is out of Miss Silveron, by Iron Constitution. A winner of five races, with three seconds and three thirds from 18 starts, Silver Partner has earnings of \$57,194.

Deputed Testamony Starter Handicap

Owner/trainer Katherine Sancuk's No Brakes rallied from next to last in the field of eight to win the \$25,000 Deputed Testamony Starter Handicap, the first of nine stakes on Preakness Day, May 21.

Xavier Perez rode the Parker's Storm Cat offspring for Sancuk, who did double duty by ponying horses on the 13-race program. The 6-year-old gelding, who finished fifth in the same race last year and was claimed for \$5,000 by his present connections in March, came five wide into the stretch to score a narrow victory over Money for Love. Say Now finished third, followed by Across the Wind, Heavensmurgatroid, Gold Casing, Trappist Monk and Joel's Touch.

"I was concerned after watching the first race, because the speed was holding," said winning rider Perez. "My horse likes to lay off the pace so I had to do some thinking. We had been planning and training for this race all month long. I knew he would do well, because when I worked this horse in the morning, he likes to run for me. I just waited for him to grab the bit, and when he did I thought we would get there."

No Brakes paid \$7.60 as the second choice, and stopped the clock in 1:45.88 for the mile and a sixteenth.

Sancuk noted that she claimed No Brakes specifically for the race. "He runs hard every time," said the trainer. "He gives you a heart attack because he was so far out of it. It scared me to death. Xavier rides the hair off him. This is

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so exciting. This is my first handicap."

It was the third win from four starts on the year for the dark bay gelding bred by John Franzone Jr. Racing Inc. The

first foal out of the Mahogany Hall mare All Apologies, No Brakes has seven wins from 24 starts to date, and pushed his earnings to \$90,890.

Ben's Cat triumphs in Jim McKay Turf Sprint

The Jim Stable's Ben's Cat stormed home a convincing winner in Pimlico's \$75,000 Jim McKay Turf Sprint, the first of six stakes races on the Preakness eve card on Friday, May 20.

Last away from the starting gate under jockey Jeremy Rose, Ben's Cat covered the five-furlong distance over a yielding turf in :59.71, rallying through the stretch to win with ears pricked by two lengths. Local Celebrity finished second and Super Chunky was third. Ben's Cat paid \$5.60 as the second choice in the five-horse field decimated by scratches due to the soft conditions.

"We didn't get out there very good and I had to overcome a few things," noted Rose. "But with the scratches it didn't hurt us too much, and that's what a good horse does. The main thing was that we finished where we wanted to. He was ready."

Bred, owned and trained by legendary Maryland trainer King Leatherbury, the 5-year-old son of Parker's Storm Cat was winning for the 10th time in 14 starts. Ben's Cat had to recover from a broken hip before he made his maiden debut at 4, then won his first eight starts, including victories in three turf stakes. In gaining his fifth career stakes win, Ben's Cat boosted his career earnings to \$316,230.

Leatherbury bred Ben's Cat from a Maryland family that has remained productive for the trainer for more than three decades. Ben's Cat is out of the multiple stakes-placed mare Twofox (by Thirty Eight Paces), a full sister to 1987 Maryland-bred champion 2-year-old filly Thirty

Eight Go Go, whom Leatherbury trained to win multiple graded stakes and \$871,229. A half-sister to Twofox was graded winner Notches Trace (\$360,562), the Maryland-bred champion older female of 1988. Another of Twofox's full sisters, Endette, produced Leatherbury's outstanding homebred Ah Day (\$914,024), the champion Maryland-bred 3-year-old male of 2006, as well as Maryland Million Classic winner Due.

Concealed Identity proves best in Tesio Stakes

Linda Gaudet and Morris Bailey's Concealed Identity sat off a contested pace, went by the leaders going around the turn and continued home under a hard drive to win the \$75,000 Federico Tesio Stakes, the feature offering for possible Preakness starters at Pimlico on May 7. The race earned the son of Smarty Jones a berth in the Preakness, in which he wound up 10th.

Sent off in the Tesio as the fourth choice at 7.30-1 under leading jockey Sheldon Russell for trainer Eddie Gaudet, Concealed Identity won by

two lengths and completed the mile and a sixteenth distance in 1:45.67. Post time favorite Ruler On Ice, who failed to get into the starting gate in the Kentucky Derby-G1 due to a lack of graded earnings, took second by a neck over J W Blue. The winner paid \$16.60 and topped a \$60 exacta and \$141.80 triple.

Concealed Identity was winning the second stakes of his eight-race career, having captured the Maryland Juvenile Championship last December. He came into the Tesio off an impressive allowance score at the distance over the Pimlico strip on April 15.

"He ran excellent today," Russell said. "We were very impressed how he ran last time, the first time going two turns. Last time they took the blinkers off him because he only has one eye and we were able to relax him there and get him into good position early on and he finished so much better. He came home running today and didn't seem like he was slowing down."

Concealed Identity upped his earnings to \$120,780 with his fourth career win. The second foal out four-time stakes winner Richetta (by Polish Numbers), he was bred by Bowman & Higgins Stable and Patricia L. Chapman, who owned and bred Smarty Jones with her late husband, Roy Chapman. Concealed Identity was purchased by Gaudet at the Fasig-Tipton Midlantic Eastern Fall Yearling sale for \$16,000.

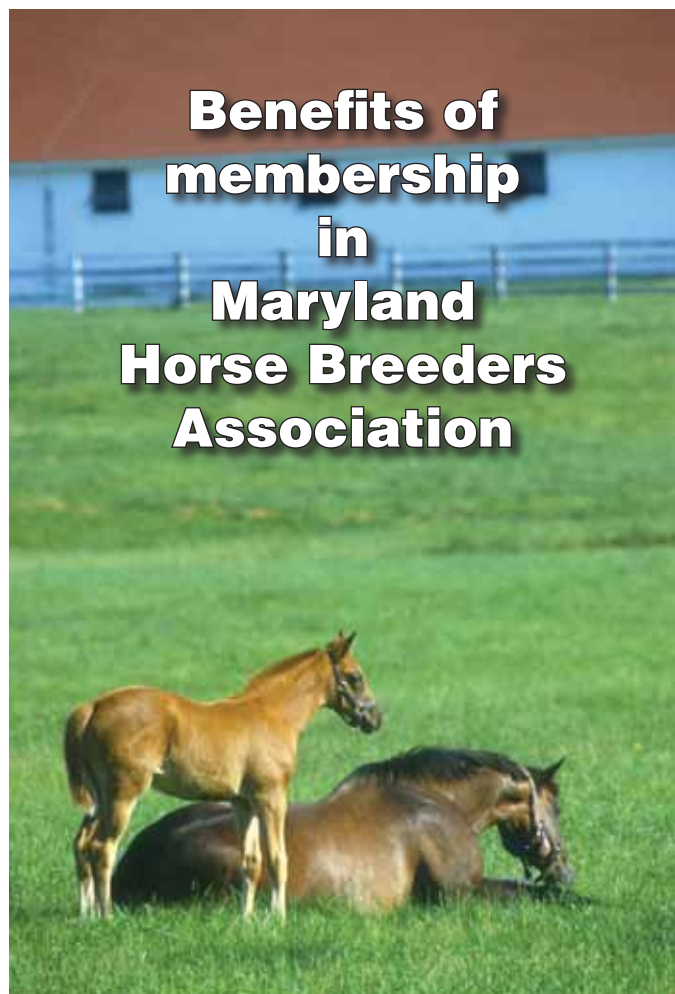
