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Storied farm man Richard Harris leaves Country Life for country living

When Richard Harris retired in early June, it was more than the end of an era for Country Life Farm. During his 27-year tenure at Maryland's oldest Thoroughbred nursery, located in Bel Air, Harris became as much a Pons family member as valued employee.

"It seemed as though Richard had always been here," said Country Life matriarch Mary Jo Pons.

Mary Jo still vividly remembers the day Harris and two other men reported for work at the farm. Her husband, the late Joseph P. (Joe) Pons, served on the board of directors of The Mann House, a private, nonprofit substance abuse rehabilitation facility in downtown Bel Air. A recovered alcoholic himself, Pons had devoted a great deal of his time as a staunch advocate for others trying to rebuild their lives.

"There were three men who came at that same time, when [sons] Josh and Michael were finishing with school,"

Mary Jo said. "Then there was a need for help because Josh, Michael and Joe had arranged for a couple of stallions to come to the farm, so there was work that needed to be done. Richard became more familiar with the mares, foals and stallions, and he became night watchman.

"There was a signal—an old pump handle down in the barn—that Richard would use

to alert Joe up here in the big house that a mare was about to foal. If Richard pumped that old cast-iron handle two or three times, there was a loud clanging noise, and we all knew that someone had better get down to the barn right away. I can still hear it to this day."

It was Harris's affinity with mares and foals that eventually earned him an important

place both in the storied tale of Country Life and the annals of American Thoroughbred racing. On April 18, 1990, Harris attended a Seattle Slew mare named Solar Slew during the delivery of a healthy bay colt by Palace Music. Later named Cigar, the colt won 16 straight races, was voted Horse of the Year in 1995 and 1996, and earned a North American record \$9,999,815 until Curlin surpassed him in 2008.

While Harris surely took tremendous pride in the accomplishments of Cigar—as he did in each of the foals he delivered—the humble West Virginia native typically downplayed his role as Country Life’s foaling man extraordinaire. In subsequent years, enthralled visitors to the farm were always introduced to Harris as “the man who foaled Cigar.” As Josh Pons said, “It weren’t nothing,” was Harris’s standard reply whenever the subject was raised.

Born in Jenkin Jones, W.Va., in December 1944, Harris is unanimously described by all of his Country Life

colleagues as painfully shy. “But,” Mary Jo Pons shared, “you could write a book about Richard, and there are just so many wonderful stories.”

Not surprisingly, Harris’s close bond with Joe Pons formed the nucleus of a great many of those tales. “He and Joe were the best of friends,” Mary Jo said. “Joe had always told Richard that if we ever got a really good colt, we were going to name it Jenkin Jones.” That colt, by Malibu Moon out of Cautionary Tale (by Caveat), was born in Virginia in 2002. Winner of the HBPA Governor’s Cup Handicap at Charles Town in 2007, Jenkin Jones made 51 starts, won 10 and earned \$268,855.

Over the years, Harris became known for his weekly gatherings during the NFL season. “Each Monday night during football season, every man on the farm would be at Richard’s house,” said Mary Jo. “If you needed any man at all on this farm—Michael, Josh, young Josh, August, Philip, David, Joe Pons—they’d ALL be at Richard’s, watching the game. Joe

would sit in a chair that Richard named ‘the mean chair.’ And, of course, Joe controlled the remote from the mean chair. I don’t know what the root of that was. And he didn’t call Joe by his name; he called him ‘Sky.’ I have no idea why or how that started, and the boys don’t know either. I’ve got a sneaky notion that one night when things were dull the two of them must have seen a movie together about Montana or something!”

While Harris customarily resisted any notion of a celebratory send-off before leaving Maryland for Bluefield, W.Va., on June 11, his Country Life family did manage to surprise him with a hugely significant parting gift. Co-worker Kevin Brown, a skilled woodworker, crafted an Adirondack-style chair out of a Country Life poplar tree that had fallen in a storm. The piece was presented to Harris as everyone gathered in the farm office a few days before his departure.

“Kevin fashioned this chair for Richard out of wood

from Country Life,” Mary Jo smiled. “He loved it.”

On Belmont Stakes day, Mike Pons, along with sons Philip and David, loaded the chair and the rest of Harris’s belongings into the Country Life Farm pickup and goose-neck trailer and made the eight-hour drive to Bluefield, where Harris will live in a house not far from his brother and sister-in-law. Fishing and camping high on his to-do list, Harris plans to enjoy time with his family at Hungry Mother State Park in Smyth County, Va., long a favorite vacation destination.

According to Mike Pons, “Richard is the older brother that we never had. It was bittersweet to see him go. He helped deliver about 1,200 Maryland-bred foals, held mares for more than 10,000 covers in the breeding shed [between foaling and breeding, those foals earned maybe \$25 million] and drove probably more than 100,000 tractor miles around here. If there is a Maryland Horse Hall of Fame, then he belongs in it.”

—IN MEMORIAM—

Katharine Jenkins



Katharine (Kitty) Jenkins, retired Master of the Green Spring Valley Hounds and a member of one of the most decorated families of horse-people in Maryland, died on June 26. She was 81.

A daughter of Janon Fisher Jr., one of the founders of the Maryland Horse Breeders Association, Mrs. Jenkins grew up on The Caves farm in Eccleston. She received widespread praise for develop-

ing Mountain Dew, a horse she personally hunted and turned over to her brother, Janon Fisher III, to ride in timber races. Trained by her father, Mountain Dew went on to win the Maryland Hunt Cup three times (1962, '65 and '67) and the Maryland Grand National six times (1962-63, 1965-68), twice defeating the legendary Jay Trump. Frank Bell, who worked for the Fishers for decades, recalled in a story for *The Maryland Horse* in April 1989, that upon Mountain Dew's retirement from racing, he "went back to fox-hunting [with Mrs. Jenkins] and kept going until he was 23 years old."

A devoted foxhunter, accomplished rider and business-like field master, Mrs. Jenkins was appointed joint-Master of the Green Spring Valley in 1975, and served as Master until her retirement in 1987. Her father had also been a master of Green Spring, when appointed in 1922.

The Maryland Hunt Cup has been a family legacy dating back to the late 1930s, when Mrs. Jenkins's father

trained three-time Hunt Cup winner Blockade. This spring, Mrs. Jenkins's sister, Julie Fisher Colhoun, won the Hunt Cup as co-owner of Private Attack.

Mrs. Jenkins remained active upon retiring, and was remembered by current joint-Master of the Green Spring Valley Hounds, Sheila Brown:

"She loved hounds, horses and hunting; even after retirement she would drive her pony trap over to the kennels to make sure everything was just so. It was a treat to bring the new entry over for her inspection, and we would always let her know the first day we were going to put hounds in the covert, so she could get up at the crack of dawn and listen to the hound music in the corn."

Mrs. Jenkins's husband, Charles Frick Jenkins, was vice-president of Alex Brown Realty Inc. and a member of the Green Spring Valley Hunt Club when he died in October 1977 at age 50. Mrs. Jenkins lived in Glyndon, across the road from Green Spring's kennels.

Bold Affair scores in lucrative Jostle Stakes

Mike Zanella and Charles Reed's homebred Bold Affair rallied from last under jockey Stewart Elliott, overcame a wide trip and outfinished favored Strike the Moon to win the \$200,000 Jostle Stakes by a length on June 11 at Parx Racing. It was the first stakes win for the 3-year-old Maryland-bred filly and avenged a narrow defeat three weeks earlier at Pimlico in the Miss Preakness Stakes.

Breaking from the outside post in the field of six sophomore fillies, Bold Affair trailed in the opening furlong of the main track test and found herself stuck well out into the middle of the track the entire run down the backstretch.

Bold Affair began her rally five wide turning for home and forged a slight lead over early pacesetters Strike the Moon and Ms. Cruisen'. All three had had rough trips as they came to the final furlong. Ms. Cruisen' had been stuck on the inside of a five-way fight for the lead. Strike the Moon had been with that pace battle fighting on in heavy

traffic and Bold Affair by far had the longest distance to travel. Having taken the lead turning for home, Bold Affair would not give it up. Ms. Cruisen' finally surrendered down at the rail, but Strike the Moon fought on. Through the last furlong, Bold Affair was going just slightly better and edged away from her game rival to win by a hard-fought length.

Sent off at 4-1, Bold Affair, trained by Howard Wolfendale, paid \$10 to win. The final time for six and a half furlongs over a track labeled fast was 1:17.07.

A daughter of one of Maryland's all-time top sires, the recently deceased Two Punch, Bold Affair is out of the stakes-winning Colonial Affair mare Hunka Hunka Lori Z. Purchased by Reed out of the Fasig-Tipton Midlantic Eastern Fall Yearling sale in 1999 for \$7,000, Hunka Hunka Lori Z campaigned for Reed and Zanella throughout her career, in which she made 34 starts, won seven races and earned \$266,533. Among her victories were the Caesar's Wish Stakes at Pimlico and Stefanita Stakes at Laurel Park.

Bold Affair is Hunka Hunka Lori Z's third winner from three foals, and a full sister to \$143,075-earner Lori Z's Punch. Unraced at 2, Bold Affair swept to an eight-length score in a six-furlong maiden special weight in her debut on April 10 at Pimlico and followed that four weeks later with a nearly four-length romp while under a hand ride in allowance company. Taking the next step, the chestnut filly went to the post for the Miss Preakness Stakes in which

she finished a game third, beaten less than a length by R Holiday Mood and Strike the Moon. With her stakes win, Bold Affair boosted her career earnings to \$163,020 from four starts.

Hunka Hunka Lori Z has not had a live foal since producing Bold Affair and did not conceive the past two breeding seasons.

Colony Club surprises in Fort Monmouth Stakes

Owner/trainer Alexandra S. White's Colony Club sat off the early pace before moving strongly through the lane to wear down pacesetter Ahvee's Destiny in the \$65,000 Fort Monmouth Stakes at Monmouth Park on June 4.

The victory proved extra special for White, as it was the trainer's first stakes victory. It was also a special win for rider Forest Boyce, who won her first career race as a jockey aboard Colony Club on June 30, 2009, at Colonial Downs.

Colony Club covered the five and a half furlongs over firm turf in 1:02.17 and returned \$23.60, \$9.80 and \$6. Ahvee's Destiny held for second, a half-length back. The exacta returned \$154.60.

"She's a very nice filly," Boyce said. "You can put her wherever. She can race on the lead or from behind. She's a tough little filly, and everything worked out well today."

White, who trains Colony Club off Andor Farm in Monkton, sent her out three weeks later to finish fifth, beaten just over two lengths, in Colonial Downs's Buckland Stakes.

A 5-year-old Maryland-bred mare by Lion Hearted, Colony Club sports a record of 5-4-0 from 14 lifetime starts.

She has banked \$142,169 for White, who purchased her as a yearling for \$7,500 out of the consignment of breeder Bohemia Stable at the 2007 Fasig-Tipton Midlantic Eastern Fall Yearling sale.

A member of one of the late Allaire duPont's famed broodmare lines, Colony Club is the first stakes performer out of the Wild Again mare Wild Shine, a full sister to 2003 Maryland-bred Horse of the Year Shine Again, the millionaire who was champion state-bred older mare three consecutive years (2001 to 2003) and champion sprinter twice. Shine Again captured seven stakes, including back-to-back editions of Saratoga's Ballerina Handicap-G1. Wild Shine is also a half-sister to graded stakes winner Shiny Band.

Wild Shine produced Colony Club as her fourth foal. The mare, who has four winners from six foals of racing age, died at the age of 9 after producing eventual winner Punta Sal, a colt by Aptitude, in 2008.

Triple Dip gets stakes win in first timber start

In his first sanctioned timber start, Michael A. Smith's Triple Dip posted a significant upset by notching a two-length victory in the \$50,000 Mason Houghland Memorial at the Iroquois Steeplechase in Nashville, Tenn., on May 14. Trained by Jimmy Day and ridden by champion jockey Paddy Young, the 8-year-old gelding by Storm Broker had not made an official start since May 15, 2010, when he was pulled up at Malvern in a claiming hurdle race. One week prior to that race, he had been pulled up in the Calvin Houghland Iroquois Hurdle Stakes-NSA1.

The Mason Houghland was Triple Dip's first score since his 2008 victory in the Noel Laing Hurdle Stakes by a nose at Montpelier. During a six-year career, Triple Dip has started 16 times, winning four and finishing second once (in the Gladstone Hurdle at Far

Hills as a 3-year-old), for earnings of \$109,935.

Bred by High Mountain Farm LLC, Triple Dip is out of the Be My Native mare Triple Wrapped (Ire). His second dam is the successful Irish hurdle stakes winner Double Wrapped (Ire), a half-sister to English hurdle stakes winner Prominent King.

Wild Jacob makes it a memorable day for Bohemia Stable

Stanley Mankin's Wild Jacob rallied strongly in the stretch to catch leader Fairing in the final strides and capture the \$60,000 Prairie Mile Stakes on the evening of June 4 at Prairie Meadows. Making his stakes debut, Wild Jacob won the one-mile race for 3-year-olds by a half-length and completed the distance in 1:37.88.

The race was marred by a horrific accident between the three-sixteenths and furlong markers in which one of the early leaders fell, causing a chain reaction that took three other runners down with him. Wild Jacob, with Ken Tohill in the irons, was making a six-wide move and avoided the tragedy that unfolded to his inside.

Trained by Doug Anderson, Wild Jacob has won three of his four starts since April 2, and just missed when second by a neck in his prior outing on May 14 at Prairie Meadows. From seven lifetime starts, he has three wins, a sec-

ond and two thirds for total earnings of \$86,814.

A gelded son of Eurosilver, Wild Jacob was bred in Maryland by Bohemia Stable out of the Cozzene mare Let's Coast. He was sold by his breeder at the 2009 Keeneland September yearling sale for \$11,000, with Mankin signing the ticket.

A descendant from another successful Allaire duPont family, Wild Jacob is the second foal, and second stakes performer, for Let's Coast. Her first foal, Star Anna (f., 2007, by Domestic Dispute), was the runnerup in the 2010 Maryland Filly Championship Stakes and has earned \$96,268 to date.

Let's Coast is a half-sister to multiple stakes winner and graded stakes-placed Kitty Knight, a daughter of Capote who earned \$195,656. Wild Jacob's third dam, Give a Toast, was a \$235,000 Keeneland July Yearling sale purchase and went on to win four stakes, including the Beaugay Handicap-G3, and earn \$222,766.

Now 10, Let's Coast produced a filly by Two Punch this year and has a Scat Daddy yearling filly, both bred in the name of Mrs. duPont's daughter, Lana Wright. Her current 2-year-old, a filly by Harlan's Holiday named Harlan's Crown, was sold as part of the Bohemia Stable dispersal at the 2010 Keeneland January sale for \$37,000.

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MHBA annual awards dinner

The Maryland Horse Breeders Association held its Annual Awards Dinner on June 22 at the Baltimore County Center for Maryland Agriculture in Hunt Valley.

The ceremony toasted 2010 Maryland-bred champions and two distinguished humans: Robert E. Meyerhoff

added to the trophy case yet again with his 10th Breeder of the Year Award, and J. William Boniface of Bonita Farm received the Federico Tesio Award for exceptional contributions to the state breeding and racing industry.

Richard's Kid, bred by Meyerhoff, was honored as

Maryland-bred Horse of the Year for the second consecutive year. Tough Broad, another Meyerhoff-bred and the deceased dam of Richard's Kid, also repeated as Broodmare of the Year. Not For Love, Northview Stallion Station's dynamic stud, was named Stallion of the Year for the eighth time.

Graham Motion, trainer of Kentucky Derby-G1 winner Animal Kingdom, served as guest speaker.
