Murmur relishes success of Scipion

Full-brother to champion Vindication sires Maryland Million winner, inches up region's juvenile sire list

Life is busy these days around Murmur Farm. Allen and Audrey Murray, respected and well known throughout the Thoroughbred industry for their hands-on approach, are wrapping up the year, taking care of some personal affairs, and gearing up for another breeding season.

They would like nothing more than to keep busy, for that phone to keep ringing, for the inquiries to keep rolling in about their up-and-coming young stallion Scipion.

Scipion, a three-quarter brother to the late champion and promising Kentucky sire Vindication, led the Maryland freshman sires list in 2011 and is doing equally, if not better, in 2012 with another strong group of 2-year-olds. Scipion's second crop includes Keep Momma Happy, who came into the Oct. 6 Maryland Million at Laurel Park as an unraced maiden and exited a winner of the rich sires stakes following a neck victory in the \$100,000 Fasig-Tipton Maryland Million Nursery.

Keep Momma Happy, who had to draw in off the also-eligible list and paid \$48.60, joined Pitch N Roll as Scipi-

on's two juvenile stakes winners this season and five overall 2-year-old winners in 2012.

"He was leading freshman sire in Maryland last year," Audrey Murray said Nov. 8, the day after Scipion sired another winner in 3-year-old filly Breezy Girl in the opener at Laurel. "And he's doing just as well with his second crop. We're very pleased."

A 10-year-old by A.P. Indy out of Strawberry Reason, by Strawberry Road (Aus), Scipion stands at Murmur in Darlington for \$3,000, a value compared to many of his contemporaries ranked near him

on the region's juvenile and second-crop sire lists.

Scipion bred 49 mares his first season at Murmur, a strong number for a young stallion in the region whose best performances on the racetrack were two and three years earlier. He covered 38 his second season. Like nearly all young stallions, the numbers slipped in subsequent seasons as the newness feeling so many breeders clamor for wore off.

The Murrays hope Scipion's recent success will produce a 2013 resurgence for the syndicated stallion.

"We dropped his fee to entice breeders to breed to him," Murray said. "They're giving away such deals in Kentucky that it's tough, really tough. Phenomenal deals. Our shareholders were not real happy, but we had to be competitive. At \$3,000 he's a real bargain and I think we're better off [keeping him at that level]. We're going to try and get as many mares as we can to him."

"I'd hope for 60 mares, but a lot of our clients have either sold their mares or gotten out of the business entirely. That's going on not just here, but in Kentucky, and around the world."

One of Scipion's continued supporters is his breeder, Virginia Kraft Payson, who still owns four shares in the stallion. Others involved include longtime Murmur client William Harris, owner and breeder of Breezy Girl; Charles and

Cynthia McGinnes, and Dr. Steven Sinatra.

"When we syndicated him we actually didn't sell all the shares," Murray said. "It was difficult because we purchased him just before things went south. A lot of people were afraid to invest. We really actually own most of him."

Quick start

Success with juveniles should not be surprising for Scipion, who was a much hyped 2-year-old debut winner during the 2004 Saratoga meet for Payson and trainer Patrick Biancone. Listed as sold for \$1.9 million at the 2003 Fasig-Tipton Saratoga sale, Scipion never actually changed hands, with Payson retaining ownership and campaigning the colt throughout his career.

Scipion did not give off an aura of precocity in that de-

but, however, dropping back to eighth and last in a 7-furlong maiden event before closing like a rocket on the outside. The highlight of his initial season was a third behind Bellamy Road next time out in the Cradle Stakes-G3 at River Downs.

Scipion looked like a classics contender early in his sophomore season, winning the Risen Star Stakes-G3 at Fair Grounds before an unplaced effort in the Louisiana Derby-G2 forced him to the sidelines until late fall. He did not win the next two seasons, but managed a stakes placing at 12 furlongs in the Point Given Stakes at Monmouth before retiring.

Shortly after Scipion retired in September 2007 it looked like Florida would be

the starting spot for his stud career.

"We were interested in him, but it looked like he was going to Florida," Murray said. "During the negotiations, [McGinnes] recommended Maryland, and he recommended us. He said, 'they're hands on.' So he came here rather than Florida."

"After Scipion came here, about a week later [Payson] stopped here to see him. Then shortly after that she went to the Keeneland [November] sale and bought four mares to breed to him.

"He's a lovely horse, a beautifully correct horse. He brought \$1.9 million at the sales, so you'd expect him to be correct. We couldn't be more pleased."

Maryland-breds bolster successful Fasig-Tipton Midlantic sale

Nearly a quarter of the yearlings sold at the Fasig-Tipton Midlantic Eastern Fall Yearling sale, held on Oct. 1 at the Timonium Sales Pavilion, were Maryland-breds, and the average (\$22,974) and median (\$16,000) for the 65 sold were higher than the overall sale. Only six who went through the ring were not sold (an 8 percent buyback rate).

This year's sale, downsized to one day and 375 hips compared to 535 horses offered in 2011, saw a rise in gross to \$6,166,100, and the average increase 20.6 percent to \$22,341.

A colt by Ghostzapper out of Maryland-bred stakes winner Fancy Diamond (by Eastern Echo) was the highest-priced of the Maryland-breds sold. Lambholm, agent, purchased the bay, a May foal, for \$90,000 from breeders Charles and Cynthia McGinnes' Thornmar Farm LLC. The colt is the first foal out

of Fancy Diamond, who was bred by Thornmar, sold as a yearling in 2005 for \$18,000 and went on to win or place in four stakes and earn \$276,695. The McGinneses repurchased the mare for \$55,000 out of the 2010 Keeneland November sale.

The highest-priced Maryland-sired yearling was the second most expensive Maryland-bred, a Great Notion colt sold by his breeder, Carol Kaye, with agent Sally Thomas. Ellen Charles made the purchase for \$85,000.

Out of Love Me Twice (by Not For Love), the colt named Phlash Phelps is a half-brother to Action Andy, a six-time stakes winner of \$524,430 who won two stakes, the Maryland Million Sprint and Frank J. De Francis Memorial Dash, in the weeks following the sale.

Good Prospects

Racing exhibit turns back time at Harford Community College

Harford Community College, on the outskirts of the town of Bel Air, is a typical campus of tree-lined sidewalks, classroom buildings, tennis courts and baseball fields. So it may seem an odd venue for an exhibition about Thoroughbred racing.

But a little research goes a long way to explain why the college is hosting the exhibit *Beauty in Sport: Celebrating Horse Racing in Harford County* through January.

The display of photographs, paintings, silks and other horseracing memorabilia opened on Oct. 19 at the college's historic Hays-Heighe House, and showcases a somewhat forgotten chapter of Maryland's storied racing history. Not so incidentally, it is a chapter that played out on the site of the current college campus, which at one time was a bustling private Thoroughbred operation known as Prospect Hill Farm.

In 1921, Robert Heighe and his wife Anne McElderry Heighe purchased the 160-acre Harford County farm which had long been in the possession of the family of Mrs. Heighe's brother-in-law. Six years later, the Heighes inherited a vast fortune upon the death of Robert Heighe's aunt, Ellen Winchester Duryea, which included racing interests in a stable developed by Duryea's late husband, prominent New York sportsman and turf patron Herman Duryea.

The Duryea stable was a well-established and successful one. Long associated with Harry Payne Whitney, Duryea won the 1903 Brooklyn Handicap and 1904 Metropolitan Stakes. In 1912, his Sweeper

captured England's 2,000 Guineas. One of Duryea's most notable racing achievements, however, came two years prior to his death, when his French-bred *Durbar II won the 1914 English Derby. The classic winner would go on to become an important broodmare sire, and decades later played a significant role in the effort to preserve Prospect Hill's history.

Anne Heighe took a particular interest in the horses and the farm—so much so that she would eventually come to be known as “Maryland's First Lady of Racing.” In 1932, noted Maryland horseman and historian D. Sterrett Gittings described the farm:

With the natural advantages of Prospect Hill Farm, including excellent

pasturage—one field having not been ploughed for seventy-five years—an abundance of good water, well ventilated stabling with roomy box stalls, there is every reason to anticipate a bright future for this establishment both in the paddock and on the turf. The buildings at the Farm are neatly painted white, with green trimmings—the racing colors; all the stock show the affectionate dispositions that can come only from gentle handling.

Although racing became Anne Heighe's passion, the Heighes did not reside at the farm, instead living a few miles closer to Bel Air at Moore's Mill, the stone house they built and named after the old mill that originally stood on that property. The home

was furnished with museum-quality antiques the Heighes had inherited from Duryea.

Prospect Hill's original stone house with its 1808 date-stone, enlarged over the decades, became home to those who worked on the farm, including such recognizable names as Boniface and Mergler.

Five generations of Bonifaces have been associated with racing in Maryland, but the family business began in the 1930s at Prospect Hill, which was managed by English immigrant Fritz Boniface. Boniface was the father of four sons. Sydney and Jack would become trainers, Jack eventually training for the Heighes. William, after working for a time as an exercise rider and apprentice jockey, became the racing editor of the *Baltimore Sun*. Harry, although a horseman, chose not to make that field of work his career. Fritz Boniface's grandson, J. William Boniface, operates Bonita Farm with his family.

Joe Mergler began his Thoroughbred career in 1922 as a jockey, although by his own admission he “wasn't much of a rider.” He was overshadowed by the success of his cousins, Charles, J.C., Donald and “Monk” Mergler of Havre de Grace. Joe found it difficult to make weight and in 1934 ended his career in the irons and went to work for the Heighes. By the late 1940s he had been Prospect Hill's head trainer for several years.

Two surviving scrapbooks meticulously kept for Anne Heighe and donated to the Historical Society of Harford County are filled with news articles and race charts that give testimony to Mer-

of poor health, Anne Heighe died on May 27, 1953.

The Heighes had no children, and Mrs. Heighe's heir and executor, nephew Bradford Jacobs—son of her sister Sarah McElderry Jacobs and a descendant of the original land owners—had no interest in racing and immediately made arrangements for the dispersal and liquidation of the stable and sale of the farm. The property was sold to his uncle Frank Hays Jacobs Jr. Following deaths in the family, the land was purchased by Hugh Vaughn in 1955. The county became owners in 1962 with designs to use it for a junior college.

Most of the buildings were razed. The stone house was retained and used for administrative offices although the

frame addition was taken down. One of the barns stood for some years as the site of a summer stock theater. It too was eventually demolished, leaving the house and a small stone springhouse as the only reminders of what had once been.

That might have been the end of the story—another important Thoroughbred farm ploughed under, built upon and forgotten—but it didn't end there. In 1996, while researching an article on the history of racing in Harford County, I discovered *Durbar II while combing through back issues of *The Maryland Horse*. So began a mission—to have this important sire acknowledged in some manner and the history of the farm recorded.

Officials at the college indicated that if definitive proof of the story could be found, they would consider a marker. A talk with Fritz's son Bill Boniface confirmed what the magazine had reported. The famous stallion was indeed buried, forgotten, on the college campus. The definitive proof? Boniface had witnessed the stallion's interment in front of the main house.

After years of planning, raising capital and undergoing renovations, the Hays-Heighe House was opened on June 17, 2010, for use as a cultural center and multi-purpose venue, with a significant nod to the property's racing history. A rich past not to be forgotten.

4 gler's success as a trainer and Heighe's success as a breeder. While Mergler trained and took the string on the road, the farm was ably attended by Paul Weaver, who had succeeded Fritz Boniface as farm manager. Weaver too was given praise for the role he played in bringing up the young stock and helping them get to the track.

Anne Heighe was partial to *Durbar II blood and although her stable of broodmares was small they were a select group. She was not the only one to recognize the stallion's importance. Sylvester Labrot campaigned *Durbar II descendants, among them the stallion's Maryland-bred

granddaughter, champion Tred Avon.

In the autumn of 1931, *Durbar II was shipped to Prospect Hill after having stood at Claiborne Farm in Kentucky since 1924, when he was imported from France. Twenty years old, he died not long afterward and was buried on the farm.

Robert Heighe, slim and good-looking, down to earth with a great sense of humor, was as at ease with a farmer as he was with a fellow owner and treated everyone in the same manner. He died on April 1, 1947, at Moore's Mill after a long illness, leaving his wife to carry on the racing enterprise. After several years

Foxie G Foundation established for horse aftercare

The Foxie G Foundation has been established to provide the rescue, rehabilitation and re-homing of Thoroughbreds.

Based at Jerry and Laurie Calhoun's Summer Wind

Farm in Union Bridge, the foundation facilitates permanent retirement and adoption solutions for horses on or off the track. The roster of retirees includes multiple stakes winners Private Slip, 18, Fireside

Brass, 21, and Silver Tango, 24, but racehorses needn't have won at all to qualify, said Laurie Calhoun, a foundation board member.

"Horses coming into our adoption program are evaluated, given time to let down or have their injuries heal before being placed in a permanent home," Calhoun said, adding that a horse adopted out can return to the farm for any reason.

Named for Foxie G, a Maryland-bred winner of 14 races, nine stakes and \$392,568 in the 1990s, the foundation extends its adoption services to cats and has pending status as a 501(c)(3) corporation.

Delaunay makes light work of Bet On Sunshine Stakes

The even-money favorite in the field of six sent out for Churchill Downs' Bet On Sunshine Stakes on Nov. 3, Delaunay recovered quickly from a bump out of the gate to vie for the early lead under Shaun Bridgmohan, took control after a half mile in :45.71 and drew clear to win by 5½ lengths in a final time of 1:10.19 for 6 furlongs. The 5-year-old earned a 100 Beyer speed figure in recording his third stakes win of the year.

Owned by Maggi Moss, Delaunay, was claimed by trainer Tom Amoss on her behalf for \$40,000 on May 12 at Churchill Downs, a race he won. Delaunay is undefeated in his three starts at the Kentucky track, having also taken the Kelly's Landing Stakes in June.

In September, Delaunay shipped to Louisiana Downs to win the Temperence Hill Stakes. From 10 starts this year, he has won six for earnings of \$187,055.

Delaunay started out the year at Laurel Park in the barn

of Dickie Small, who trained him for breeder Robert Meyerhoff's Fitzhugh LLC. The Smoke Glacken gelding was claimed out of a fourth-place effort on Jan. 13 by Jamie Ness, and would be claimed four more times during the winter and early spring before making his way to Churchill.

Delaunay is the third generation bred by Meyerhoff tracing to the mare Wings of Jove (by Northern Jove). Delaunay's granddam is graded stakes winner and \$405,284-earner Broad Smile. His dam, Perilous Night (by Coronado's Quest), is a stakes winner of \$129,880.

Delaunay is the second foal out of Perilous Night, and is a year-older half-brother to Night Officer (by Officer), who finished third behind Jazzy Idea and Ben's Cat in the Laurel Dash Stakes on the turf on Oct. 27.

Delaunay boosted his lifetime mark to 35-10-8-3, with earnings of \$344,455.

Also in the field for the Bet On Sunshine was Maryland-bred graded stakes winner Havelock, making his first start since his score in Ar-

lington Park's Hanshin Cup Stakes-G3 on May 19. After bumping with Delaunay out of the gate, Havelock—the race highweight carrying four pounds more than the winner—raced evenly to finish fourth.

Grinding Speed loves the distance in the International Gold Cup

Michael Wharton's Grinding Speed, a 6-year-old son of Kentucky Derby-G1 winner Grindstone, showed very little racing on the flat as a 3-year-old in 2009. His best effort came in his fifth career start—his first on the turf—when he won a maiden race for \$5,000 claimers by nearly 3 lengths.

A change in career path was in the cards.

Under the guidance of trainer Alicia Murphy, Grinding Speed became a winner over hurdles in April 2011. But a switch to timber this year has led to his true calling. On Oct. 20 at Great Meadow, the gray gelding recorded his first stakes win in the \$50,000 International Gold Cup Timber Stakes, coming home in front by a commanding 2½ lengths.

The 75th running of the historic fall test saw six head out on course. Facing yielding turf and 3½ miles, farther than he had ever raced, Grinding Speed was patiently ridden by Mark Beecher, galloping along behind early leader Hot Rize before making his move on the final turn and drawing clear in the stretch.

Two weeks earlier, in his stakes debut, Grinding Speed finished a good second behind timber-standings leader and last year's Maryland-bred champion steeplechase horse, Incomplete, in the National Sporting Library Chronicle Cup at Virginia Fall in Middleburg.

Bred by Alan S. Kline, Mark T. Kline, Mitchell A. Kline and Madeline R. Kline, Grinding Speed is out of Coz-elia, a daughter of Eclipse Award-winning champion turf horse Cozzene. In four seasons on the flat and over jumps, he has made 18 starts,

winning five and finishing second four times, for earnings of \$84,740. In his six starts this year, all over timber, he has won three and been second in the others to earn \$55,350.

Incomplete is 3-for-3 in timber stakes in 2012

Robert A. Kinsley's Incomplete, the Maryland-bred champion steeplechaser of 2011, used a tune-up on the flat at Shawan Downs on Sept. 29 to take the \$35,000 National Sporting Library Chronicle Cup, the featured race of the 57th annual Virginia Fall Races in Middleburg on Oct. 6.

Maryland-breds swept the top three spots, as Incomplete made his usual late charge, pulling away by 1¼ lengths over Grinding Speed. Coming back on one week's rest after finishing second in Shawan Downs' Legacy Chase timber allowance, Grinding Speed finished nine lengths ahead of Triple Dip, who set the pace for most of the Chronicle Cup and held on for third.

Ridden by champion jockey Paddy Young, Incomplete ran the Chronicle Cup's 3¼ miles over timber fences in 6:42.40 on firm turf. The Chronicle Cup was the 11-year-old's third victory of the year in three starts and raised his division-leading total earnings to \$84,000. Trained in Maryland by Ann Stewart, Incomplete also has wins in the 2012 My Lady's Manor and Virginia Gold Cup.

Keeneland stakes makes it five straight for Madame Giry

Madame Giry, purchased privately last year as an un-

raced 2-year-old by her trainer, New Jersey-based Cam M. Gambolati, didn't make her first start until this past April. And it took five tries for the blaze-faced bay to break her maiden. But since that first victory, on July 6 at Belmont Park, Madame Giry has been unbeatable.

The Nutmeg Stable runner posted her fifth win in a row, and second consecutive stakes score, by taking Keeneland's \$100,000 Buffalo Trace Franklin County Stakes

on Oct. 12 by a rousing 2½ lengths.

With regular rider Eddie Castro aboard, the daughter of Castledale (Ire), sent off as second choice in the field of 10, was reserved off a quick pace of :21.20 and :44.62. Unleashed by Castro on the far turn, Madame Giry rushed past Bounding Bi (a daughter of Maryland sire Outflanker) at the eighth pole and drew off, completing 5½ furlongs on a firm turf course in 1:03.12.

Bred by Raintree Thoroughbred Farm Inc., a Towson, Md.-based racing partnership headed by founder Russell C. Schalk Jr., Madame Giry is the only winner from four foals of racing age for the First Trump mare Ballet Partner (GB). In her previous start, she captured Belmont Park's Smart N Fancy Stakes on Sept. 12, getting 6 furlongs on the turf in a stellar 1:07.98.

Since Gambolati – best known as the trainer of Kentucky Derby-G1 winner

Spend a Buck – shortened up Madame Giry and has kept her at distances under a mile, she has five wins and a second in six starts. In nine starts this year, she's earned \$266,280.

WHAT IS MHBA'S PAC?

It is a **political action committee** formed by the Maryland Horse Breeders Association. The PAC solicits voluntary contributions from individuals or corporations to support issues or assist selected candidates for public office in the state of Maryland who are interested in the problems of our industry and are willing to help us solve those problems.

WHY DO WE NEED PAC?

The largest market for horses bred in Maryland is horse racing, an industry which is closely regulated by state government. In addition, while not well understood, horse breeding is an especially important segment of Maryland agriculture. The economic well-being of racing and breeding is very much a function of the political process. It is essential to the health of our industry that we educate our elected official and support those who work with us on issues vital to our interests.

HOW DOES PAC WORK?

The PAC receives voluntary contributions through its treasurer which are then disbursed to candidates or spent supporting issues as selected by a committee headed by the chairperson of the MHBA Legislative Committee. Any administrative expense will be paid by the MHBA. Reports of PAC contributions must be filed with the State Administrative Board of Election Laws and are a matter of public record.

WHAT ARE THE LAWS GOVERNING CAMPAIGN CONTRIBUTIONS?

No corporation or individual may give more than \$4,000 to a single candidate or more than \$10,000 to all candidates in any given four-year election cycle. Any contribution to the PAC must be included in your \$10,000 total for an election.

WHAT IS THE TAX STATUS OF MY CONTRIBUTION?

There are no deductions or credits allowed on your state tax returns but federal law permits a credit of 50 percent on total political contributions up to a \$50 credit (for a \$100 contribution) on individual returns, and a \$100 credit (for a \$200 contribution) on joint returns. Political contributions are not deductible business expenses.
