True Trailblazers

'Women of the Turf' Kusner, Jackson, Williams honored at Hays-Heighe House

The old stone house at the heart of the Harford Community College campus could probably tell lots of amazing tales that it had witnessed as the home of Robert and Anne Heighe, who owned the horse farm on which the college's campus now stands.

But it would be hard-pressed to tell a better one than that of Kathy Kusner, one of the first women to ride for the United States Eques-

trian Team, the first American woman to win an Olympic medal in show jumping and the first licensed female jockey in the U.S.

Kusner, now 79, got her license on Sept. 27, 1968, when the Maryland circuit court decided in less than five minutes that—based on the 1964 Civil Rights Act—a woman could not be denied a license based on gender alone. It was a decision that overrode four de-

nials by the Maryland Racing Commission and opened the starting gates to progress.

"I'd like to thank Kathy for paving the way for us women," said Liz McKnight, the second female jockey to win the Maryland Hunt Cup in 1986, during a question-and-answer session with Kusner on Oct. 4 at HCC.

Kusner was the first to ride in the Hunt Cup in 1971. Jockey Joy Slater was the first

woman to win it in 1980 (and again in 1981) and then McKnight won in 1986. "We could never have done it without you."

Later, McKnight said Kusner "took on the authorities in a male-dominated sport. She got a lawyer and got it done. I'm not sure any of [the rest of us] would have done that. But she didn't care [about the repercussions]."

Kusner knew what she wanted and was willing to do what it took to reach her goal—"to be able to ride on the track in the afternoons, not just during practice in the mornings," she said. "I wanted to be where the action was."

The action on this cool autumn evening, where Kusner was an honored guest for the opening of the exhibit *Women of the Turf* and about to be presented with a special award for her contributions to the sport, was the Hays-Heighe House.

There Kusner was greeted as racing royalty, as she moved through the exhibit and eventually came to rest on a sofa in an upstairs room, admiring the photographic works of Lydia Williams and Cappy Jackson, on display as part of the *Women of the Turf* exhibit.

Williams and Jackson themselves were being honored as the 2019 recipients of the Robert and Anne Heighe Award for Excellence in Equestrian Journalism.

The works of all three demonstrate tenacity, focus and exceptional talent—and, not least of all, the love of the sport in which they work.

Williams, who has previously described herself as shy, seemed just that, as she answered questions in a momentarily quiet space.

When asked what she thought of being added to a list of past honorees that includes the late dean of Maryland turf writers Joe Kelly, international racing cartoonist Pierre "Peb" Bellocq and the late 13-time Emmy-winning television sports commentator Jim McKay, she said: "This

is not at all who I am. It's very nice, but it's not why I do what I do. I just do it because I like it. I enjoy it.

"It was never about being a professional photographer," continued the woman who is known to be a fixture at major races. "I just enjoy racing."

She says she loves taking photos of the young foals and the pensioners more than others. But a photo of jockey Laffit Pincay in 1979 taking the time to sign autographs for two small children, she says, is her favorite. It shows her eye for magic. And another of then soon-to-be Triple Crown winner Affirmed in 1978, running riderless the wrong way at Santa Anita during morning training, after having chucked his rider, shows her abilities with the camera. She snapped the shot, showing all four feet off the track, and every ripple of every muscle in Affirmed's chestnut coat testifies to the energy of the moment.

It is a passion for Williams, as it is for Jackson, who has expanded her work from horses to international fashion to the NFL and GQ magazine.

But the first photo Jackson had published was one of J.B. Secor and Charlie Fenwick taking their horses over a fence together, side-by-side, at the old Howard County race course. It made the cover of the *Chronicle of the Horse*, and the sport has remained her passion.

"I love horses and I'm an artist," she says. "I get that from my dad. I loved looking through my [lens], loved light. To me, it's all about light—early in the morning and late evening."

The joy of their photography could be seen, as the two came together at the exhibit and discussed their work as friends and professionals, exchanging camera settings, "500, f/8 lens, Nikon."

As for Kusner, her work was also art, but in a much different way. Longtime Maryland trainer Billy Christmas was one of few trainers in the early years of Kusner's career to give her work.

"She rode all of my horses, and they weren't very good," said Christmas.

"They weren't," agreed Kusner. "But he rode me on all his horses and I didn't even know him. But it was great for me. They gave me lots of practice. And he had one that was great. I got to ride Terrible Tiger."

Terrible Tiger was a multiple stakes winner who won 23 times in 72 starts, earning \$263,313.

"Kathy was amazing," remembered Christmas, who turns 94 in November and still has horses in training. "What she could do in the morning . . . She would take horses that were bad to handle and she'd turn them into different, better horses and better-mannered horses.

"I think she was the best I ever saw. She always desired to learn. She was a student and she always wanted to be better. She got silver at the Olympics, and it wasn't good enough. She wanted gold."

And she did win gold, though it was in the Pan American Games in 1963, on a horse named Unusual, who like Terrible Tiger, had his quirks.

"With Terrible Tiger, a horse maybe only one other person could ride, she got on him and within five days she could gallop him, put him on the outside of the track, the inside, the middle. And she could make it look easy," Christmas recalled. "She only needed four fingers [on the reins]."

Kusner smiled at that.

"Well," she said. "It wasn't quite like that. Terrible Tiger was a very tough horse. I got to ride him in a race at Marlboro [in 1971]. We won. The

next day, they bulldozed the track!"

Yes, the Marlboro racetrack is gone but the memories linger for Kusner, Christmas and others.

Riding in the races was what Kusner wanted. A horse like Terrible Tiger was a joy for her, any horse, every horse was. But she did seem to have an unusual ability to work with difficult ones.

In fact, one named Untouchable was one of those, and she competed in two Olympics [1964 and 1968] with him. They won everywhere they went, with the smallish, light horse clearing walls as high as 6 feet, 7 inches.

"He could jump high and wide," she remembered of the special horse she rode. "But in the latter part of the course, he might start going sideways during the final approach [to the jump]," she recalled laughing, as she told the crowd the story of this horse. "It was a wonderful adventure. Normally, he was such a good jumper, when he got to the jump, even when running sideways, he'd clear it, no matter how high! It was fun, fun, fun!"

Both Kusner and Untouchable wound up in the Show Jumping Hall of Fame, but like Williams and Jackson, she appreciated her horses just like they appreciated their photography.

It was and is all about the joy they bring.

The Women of the Turf exhibit will remain on display at the Hays-Heighe House at HCC through Dec. 20. Exhibit hours are Tuesdays from 1 to 3 p.m., Thursdays from 3 to 5 p.m., and Fridays and first Saturdays from 10 a.m. to noon. Admission is free.

Monitoring and promoting the state's breeding industry

Belair, Bowling Brook, Country Life, Fox Hill, Fuss, Glen Riddle, Grove, Prospect Hill, Sagamore, The Caves, Verdant Valley, Worthington... a few of these farms remain in operation today, but many woven into the fabric of the early history of the Maryland Horse Breeders Association are no more. The association published a list of 45 Maryland Thoroughbred farms for the first time in the February 1937 issue of *The Maryland Horse*, and over the decades the MHBA has kept tabs on the farms, acreage, stallions and breeding stock—all an important component of the state's agricultural industry.

The 45 farms listed in 1937 covered nearly 21,000 acres in 11 counties. Two years later, MHBA field secretary Humphrey S. Finney counted the forms returned by state breeders and found there were approximately 400 mares used for breeding in the state, with more than 60 farms reported.

By 1945, Finney provided new census figures at the MHBA's annual meeting—approximately 42,000 acres in Maryland were devoted to Thoroughbred production, divided into 115 farms. There were 55 stallions, 400 mares and approximately 300 yearlings, with bloodstock and farm properties valued at about \$5 million.

Results of an annual census from the Horse and Mule Association of America were published in *The Maryland Horse* each year, but soon more comprehensive figures on the state's Thoroughbred industry were sought.

The MHBA conducted its own census and released the figures in April 1950 in *The Maryland Horse*. Thoroughbred production was taking place at 177 farms, in 18 counties, encompassing 46,797

acres. "Accepting the most conservative of valuations," noted the magazine, "this would make the real estate alone involved in the proposition worth around \$10,000,000. Add the value of the 70 stallions and 825 broodmares, together with about 500 year-

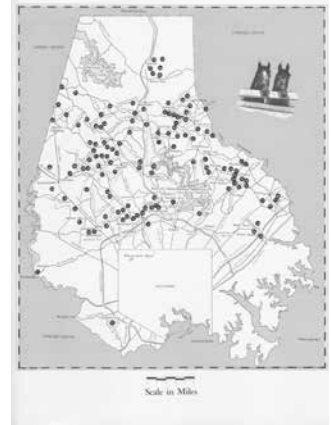
lings and miscellaneous other Thoroughbreds domiciled on the farms and not reckoned as horses in training, and one has a pretty healthy investment in Thoroughbreds in Maryland."

Numbers received a boost with the creation of The Maryland Fund in 1962. An MHBA

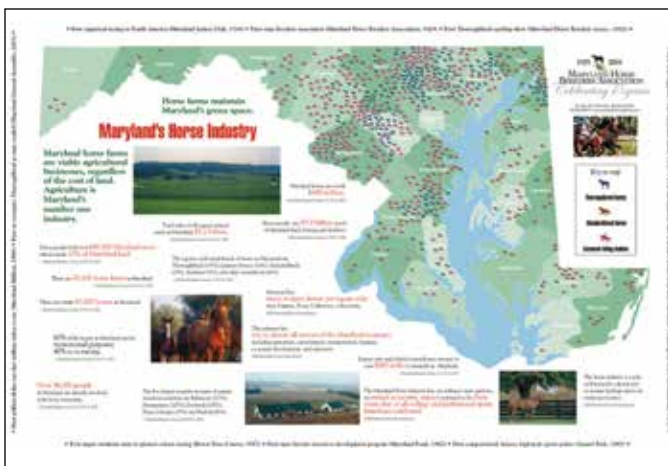


MHBA first published a map of farms in 1941 (top), and again in 1952.

survey released in April 1964 revealed there were 276 horse farms in the state, encompassing 46,047 acres. The count for Thoroughbred stallions was 158—by far the largest in the state’s history. Of the 19 counties reporting at least one horse farm, Baltimore County remained the most popular, with 88 spread over 13,139 acres. There were 28 stallions and 365 broodmares reported in Baltimore County alone.

The MHBA launched its first full-fledged stallion register and farm maps issue in January 1965, and featured a five-color map of the state’s 384 horse farms. County maps

showed the location of each Thoroughbred farm reported. The maps were updated and published annually over the next four decades.

Various state and university studies of the industry have been made in recent decades. Then in November 2016 The Sage Policy Group Survey, a study to measure the economic and fiscal impacts of Maryland’s horse industry, was released, showing increases during the decade, traceable to the Maryland Slot Machines Amendment passed in 2008.

Working in conjunction with the MHBA and closely aligned industry partners and

stakeholders, the survey team revealed gains in economic activity, jobs and revenue provided to state and local governments.

The MHBA promotes the state’s industry as well as keeping abreast of the numbers. In addition to the monthly publication of *The Maryland Horse*, and now *Mid-Atlantic Thoroughbred*, the association has produced films, farm maps and brochures, maintains websites and a social media presence, has coordinated farm tours and hosted international visitors.

By September 1949, the MHBA’s 16 mm. sound and color film *The Maryland Horse*, produced by Bernard Livingston, had been shown in 22 states. It was available to interested groups without charge beyond return postage.

The MHBA was also a supporter of the documentary *Racing the Times*, which made its debut in 2015. Covering the history of Thoroughbred racing in Maryland, it had its world premiere at the Senator Theatre in Baltimore that May, and aired on Maryland Public Television two days later. The film that was runner-up for an Eclipse Award in the category Television-Feature.

Over the decades the MHBA has organized stallion showings and retired horse parades at racetracks, farm tours across the state, and in September 1980 hosted a two-day National Breeders Conference in Hunt Valley, Md., with speakers and attendees from 22 states and Canada. Highlights included a boat trip to Chesapeake City, where Windfields Farm stallions Northern Dancer and The Minstrel were on display. When Russian connections arrived for the Washington, D.C., International in 1987, they were shown area breeding farms by members of the MHBA board. MHBA representatives were part of a Maryland contingent to visit South Korea in 1997 to build a trade market for state-bred horses. Last December a South Korean delegation visited farms and the Timonium sales as guests of the MHBA.

In May of this year, the MHBA hosted the Maryland Thoroughbred Horse Farm Tour, a free, self-guided tour of horse farms around the state open to the public.

Getting the word out about the importance of the industry has been a goal of the MHBA since its inception. It continues to this day.

Maryland-sired foals increase in 2019

Maryland stallions had the highest percentage of increase in the nation of live foals produced in 2019 when compared to 2018, according to The Jockey Club's 2018 Breeding Statistics. Among the top 10 states and provinces based on mares covered in 2018, Maryland was one of only three to see an increase in production.

With statistics compiled through Sept. 26, Maryland saw an 11.2 percent increase with 537 Maryland-sired live foals compared to 483 report-

ed in 2018. The other states showing a rise in numbers were California, with a 2.2 percent increase, and Louisiana, 2.1 percent. The Jockey Club estimates that the number of live foals reported so far is approximately 90 percent complete.

"Maryland is the only state to have a double-digit increase in foal production for the last two years. I think the thing to attribute that to is a program where the people that run racing, the people that run breeding, and the people that own

horses are all walking in lockstep in an agreement for a long-term, stable business environment. And I think that's really the key, that allows people to invest," stated T.K. Kuegler, founder and managing partner of Wasabi Ventures Stables and current MHBA board member. "Nothing is more important to a new stallion than how many mares you can get to it and having the one jurisdiction with growth happening allows you to bring a new stallion to that state and be successful."

Keugler will stand a new stallion in Maryland in 2020.

Maryland ranked sixth on the list of states and provinces with the most mares covered

in 2018, with 877 by 31 Maryland stallions, an average of more than 28 per stallion.

Maryland stallions with more than 20 live foals reported in 2019, based on The Jockey Club's statistics are: Divining Rod, 69; Holy Boss, 49; Great Notion, 45; Golden Lad, 42; Mosler, 41; Madefromlucky, 38; Imagining, 31; Blofeld, 26; Bourbon Courage, 24; Street Magician, 22.

The Jockey Club reported that 1,630 stallions covered 32,508 mares in North America during 2018, resulting in 20,363 live foals of 2019 being reported to TJC on Live Foal Reports, a 3.6 percent decrease from last year's 21,130 live foals.

Rocky Policy steps up to win Turf Amazon

Barry Ostrager's Rocky Policy made a late move to win the \$150,000 Turf Amazon Stakes on Pennsylvania Derby Day at Parx Racing Sept. 21.

The 7-year-old mare broke quick and settled into third as pacesetter Stetson Gold sprinted around the far turn. Turning into the stretch, Rocky Policy burst for home, catching Stetson Gold and crossing the wire three-quarters of a length the best while getting 5 furlongs in :56.62.

Based in California with trainer Robert Hess Jr., Rocky Policy recorded her second stakes win, following last year's Jameela at Laurel Park when trained by Dale Capuano for Richard Vermillion. She was offered for sale this past January at the Keeneland mixed sale but failed to reach her reserve; in her first appearance of 2019 she was on the west coast at Golden Gate in April, finishing last in an al-

lowance out of the barn of Andrew Lerner for Del Mar Summer Racing Club, Barry Arnason, John Cavalli and Eric Homme. In for a \$40,000 tag, she won at Santa Anita next out, then tested graded stakes competition before being risked again for \$40,000 at Del Mar in August; she won, and her connections lost her to Hess. The Turf Amazon was her second start for her new connections—she was fifth in Monmouth Park's Safely Kept Stakes at Monmouth Park Sept. 1, also at 5 furlongs on the turf.

Now in her sixth season, Rocky Policy has three stakes-placings—seconds in the Maryland Million Lassie and Penn Ladies Dash and a third in the Sensible Lady Turf Dash. Bred in Maryland by Shamrock Farm, she is a daughter of the pensioned Shamrock stallion Rock Slide out of the Smart Strike mare

Smart Policy and is a half-sister to 2018 Maryland Juvenile Filly Championship Stakes winner Money From Heaven. After delivering a filly in February by Baltimore Bob, Smart

Policy was bred to Maclean's Music for 2020.

Rocky Policy's record improved to 35-8-4-5, for total earnings of \$410,409.



Miss J McKay shows growth in Anne Arundel County Stakes

Maxis Stable, Madaket Stables and Wonder Stables' Miss J McKay once again displayed her talent when taking the \$100,000 Anne Arundel County Stakes at Laurel Park by 5 lengths Sept. 28.

Miss J McKay made her stakes debut in the Colleen at Monmouth in early August, proved she was much the best but was disqualified from first to third after bumping rivals at the top of the stretch. Sent off the 4-5 favorite in the field of nine in the Anne Arundel County, the 2-year-old filly showed professionalism after breaking last and racing mid-pack off opening fractions of :21.47 and :45.08. Miss J McKay burst through to take the lead and drew off easily, completing the 5½ furlongs over the firm turf in 1:02.49, more than a second faster than colts ran later on the card.

"We were much happier with the whole thing, and she'll get better the more she races and gets a little experience under her. I think that's all the Colleen thing was. Just

a little greenness more than anything," trainer Cal Lynch said.

Bred by Linda Oliff Rohleder, Miss J McKay is the first stakes winner for Maryland freshman sire Hangover Kid, who stands at Murmur Farm in Darlington. She sold for \$1,500 as a weanling to D R Investments out of the 2017 Fasig-Tipton Midlantic December mixed sale. Pinhooked to the 2018 Fasig-Tipton Midlantic fall yearling sale, she made a substantial return on investment when Maxis Stable purchased her for \$55,000. The filly was an \$85,000 RNA at this year's OBS April 2-year-olds in training sale.

Miss J McKay won her debut by 5¼ lengths going 5½ furlongs on the main track at Laurel July 5, becoming her sire's first winner. Following her most recent win, her record is 3-2-0-1, with \$91,953 in earnings.

Miss J McKay is the first foal for her dam Ballykiss, a Maryland-bred daughter of Street Boss who has since pro-

duced a 2018 colt by Hangover Kid and a 2019 filly by Imagining. Ballykiss descends from one of the best families developed by famed breeder Allaire duPont at her Woodstock Farm, that of Thirty Years, Miss J McKay's graded stakes-winning fifth dam. Thirty Years produced four stakes horses from seven foals, including stakes winner Thirty Flags. Her first foal was her stakes-placed daughter Fair Rosalind (by Exclusive Native), Miss J McKay's fourth dam.

Fair Rosalind one-upped her dam as a producer, first with multiple graded stakes-winning \$463,512-earner Betty Lobelia, and then Crowned. The Maryland-bred champion 2-year-old filly of 1989 won or placed in 19 stakes, won the Delaware Handicap-G2, finished second in the Coaching Club American Oaks-G1,

placed in four other graded stakes and earned \$605,323. The daughter of Chief's Crown produced 1999 Maryland-bred Horse of the Year Best of Luck and stakes-placed Crown You. The first of her 12 foals, Approve (by Deputy Minister), is Miss J McKay's second dam.

Approve was the dam of multiple stakes-placed Xtra Heart and four other foals when she sold as a broodmare at the 2005 Fasig-Tipton Midlantic December sale in foal to Two Punch, with Green Willow Farms purchasing her for \$100,000. Ballykiss, her final foal, was born in 2011. Sold as a yearling and 2-year-old, she eventually sold at the same 2017 sale as her weanling daughter. In foal to Hangover Kid, Ballykiss was purchased by Lady Olivia at North Cliff for \$2,000.

Raging Whiskey gets first stakes win in Capote

Pappas Horse Racing Corp. and Charles Bartlett's Raging Whiskey was in a race of his own as he captured the first running of the \$75,000 Capote Stakes for 2-year-olds at Los Alamitos Race Course by 8 lengths Sept. 21.

Raging Whiskey broke sharply from his outside post and sped to the lead, set fractions of :21.55, :44.56 and

1:08.96 and powered home to win by 8 lengths, finishing the 6½ furlongs in 1:15.61.

Trained by Doug O'Neill, Raging Whiskey won his first stakes. He finished third in the Grade 3 Sanford at Saratoga, his stakes debut, was sixth in the Best Pal-G2 at Del Mar and fifth in the Del Mar Juvenile Turf Stakes three weeks before the Capote. The bay colt recorded his second win in six

starts and pushed his earnings to \$107,576.

Raging Whiskey, the first stakes winner for the region's leading freshman sire Bourbon Courage, holds a special connection with Anchor and Hope Farm, which co-bred him with Finn's Nickel and stands his sire. Raging Whiskey was consigned by Stuart Morris last year to the Fasig-Tipton Kentucky fall yearling sale and purchased

for \$25,000 by The Quarter Company. At this year's Fasig-Tipton Santa Anita 2-year-olds in training sale, he was a \$120,000 RNA.

Raging Whiskey is the fourth foal out of the Quiet American mare Fullerene, who has two winners from four starters. Fullerene was bred to Anchor and Hope's first-year sire Long River for 2020.

So Street secures first stakes victory in Howard County

Troy Johnson and Charles Lo's 2-year-old So Street proved he was up to the task in the \$100,000 Howard County Stakes, capturing his first stakes by 1½ lengths at Laurel Park Sept. 28.

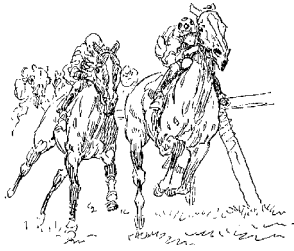
Breaking from the outside post in the field of seven, So Street quickly worked to the lead, went the first quarter :21.81, hit the top of the stretch more than 4 lengths on top, and held off late closers to stop the clock in 1:03.55 for the 5½ furlongs on the turf.

In his prior start, the gelding trained by Jamie Ness finished second behind American Pharoah's son Four Wheel Drive in Colonial Downs' Rosie's Stakes. So Street won his debut at Pimlico in May, and has been first or second in five

of his six starts. The \$3,000 sales purchase by Ness at last year's Fasig-Tipton Midlantic fall yearling sale, has earned \$145,133.

Bred by R. Larry Johnson, So Street is the fifth stakes winner sired by Johnson's homebred graded stakes winner Street Magician, who stands at Roland Farm in Chesapeake City.

So Street is one of four foals of racing age out of Johnson's homebred Mr. Greeley mare So Vain, whose other two runners are both winners—stakes placed Magician's Vanity (\$180,691) and Thissongis-aboutyou (\$102,337). So Vain is the dam of a current yearling Congrats filly named In Vain, and didn't produce a foal in 2019.
