Maryland-breds get moments at Maryland Million too

Restricted to the progeny of Maryland sires, Maryland Million Day annually celebrates the state's Thoroughbred industry like few other events—the Preakness Day scene is more festive, but different—but business is business.

When the Maryland-sired fields don't reach eight, the races are opened to Maryland-bred entries. Pari-mutuel handle matters, and as the state's sire ranks continue to rebound sometimes compromises are needed. No harm, no foul. This year's races at Laurel Park Oct. 19 featured three Maryland-bred, but not Maryland-sired, winners led by Zonda (by Scat Daddy) in the Ladies, Taco Supream (El Padrino) in the Sprint and Bowsprit (Mast Track) in the Turf Starter Handicap open to Maryland Million horses and/or Maryland-breds.

Zonda

In the \$125,000 Ladies, Matt Schera's Zonda defeated two-time race winner My Sistersledge by 1½ lengths to become a stakes winner for trainer Chuck Lawrence. Breeder Caroline Stautberg of Monkton was out of town, but celebrated with the chestnut filly born Feb. 13, 2016.

"She was just determined that she was going to win that

time," Stautberg said. "I felt so good about it when I saw her coming, I knew she wasn't going to let anybody get her."

Zonda won for the third time in eight starts (with a second) and pushed her career earnings to \$159,407 while also erasing a rough trip in the Bald Eagle Derby against males at Laurel Park. That day, the 3-year-old filly was tiring but leading in the stretch when challenged by Jais's Solitude at the sixteenth pole. Her rival drifted in, causing Zonda to take up sharply and drop back to sixth. Jais's Solitude was disqualified, but probably cost the filly a stakes-placing.

She more than made up for it in the Ladies.

"She's so beautiful and she tries so hard," said Stautberg, who sold Zonda for \$155,000

at Fasig-Tipton's Saratoga yearling sale in 2017. "The determination is what I've always just loved about her."

A daughter of the late Scat Daddy, Zonda is the eighth foal from Winning Season, a graded stakes placed daughter of Lemon Drop Kid out of the multiple graded stakes winner Topicount. Stautberg purchased Zonda's dam in 2012, in foal to Malibu Moon, following her \$110,000 RNA at the Keeneland November sale.

Zonda's second dam Topicount, a Virginia-bred daughter of Private Account, made 43 starts, 20 in graded company with wins in the 1988 Rare Perfume-G2 and 1990 Monmouth Park Budweiser Breeders' Cup-G3. She won nine races, placed in 19 others and earned \$607,618. As

a broodmare, she produced eight winners from nine starters, including stakes winners Laguna Seca, by Seattle Slew, and Winning Season.

The latter won four of 20, and at 2 won 2004 Raging Fever Stakes at Aqueduct and finished third in the Demoiselle-G2. Since producing her first foal in 2007, Winning Season is the dam of five winners, out of nine foals total. For Stautberg, she has produced yearlings who brought \$290,000 (in 2013), \$40,000 (2014) and \$75,000 (2018) in addition to Zonda's \$155,000 pricetag. Zonda is her dam's first stakes winner.

It was clear to Stautberg and farm manager Darin Martin that Zonda was a special one from the beginning.

"It's easy to say that she's the one that stood out more than anyone else since she's been so successful," said Martin. "All of [Winning Season's] foals have been very, very attractive and Zonda was just like the rest of them. She just was a little bigger and had more scope."

Zonda's half-brother Tio Wil, a 2-year-old son of Bayern, was purchased for \$75,000 at Keeneland September in 2018 by McKathan Brothers and was in training at Gulfstream Park in November. Stautberg has Winning Season's most recent foal, a weanling colt by Unified, and plans to breed the mare to something along the same lines as Zonda's late sire.

Supplemented as a racing or broodmare prospect to Fasig-Tipton Kentucky's November sale, Zonda was purchased for \$500,000 by Live Oak Stud.

Taco Supream

As Big Bertha Stable's Taco Supream drove down the stretch to capture the \$100,000 Sprint, he added to the impressive legacy that has developed through Ann Jackson's broodmare band at Fox Harbor Farm in White Hall, Md.

A 4-year-old gelded son of the late Pennsylvania sire El Padrino, the chestnut bred by Jackson captured his first

stakes by three-quarters of a length while outrunning multiple graded stakes winner Call Paul and others. Trained by Damon Dilodovico, Taco Supream won for the seventh time in 19 starts and increased his earnings to \$305,256.

"It was fun for me because I love watching the horses I've bred run and I was standing right by the finish line when Taco won," Jackson said. "As he crossed the line, this crowd erupted behind me and I realized it was the syndicate [Big Bertha], so I ran over and introduced myself. I came down [into the winner's circle] and got in the win picture too."

Jackson owns Taco Supream's dam Barouchka and owned her dam, Millashand, who spent her retirement on the farm and was euthanized last year at 22. Jackson and her late husband, Cary, had purchased Millashand, an Ontario-bred stakes winner in foal to Harlan's Holiday, for \$45,000 at the 2005 Keeneland January sale. A daughter of Regal Intention out of Soiled Dove, the mare produced nine foals, with four winners from five starters, including Raven's Choice, winner of the Maryland Hunt Cup and Grand National timber stakes in 2015 and Furman Bisher, who was grand champion of the 2010 Maryland Horse Breeders Association yearling show. Millashand's last foal was reported in 2011: Millamant, a filly by Langfuhr, who never raced.

"We had a lot of hope that Barouchka would do well when she raced, but she never could win and failed to break her maiden," said Jackson. "But she's a big, beautiful mare and she's made a wonderful broodmare, so can't complain."

Barouchka was bred by Cary, a longtime Maryland breeder, steeplechase and flat owner, and Maryland Horse Breeders Association yearling show participant, who passed away in 2011 following a car accident on his way home from Lexington, Ky. Cary had gained permanent possession of the yearling show's Chanceland Challenge Trophy the year prior to his passing, following his third win and donated the Foxharbor Farm Challenge Trophy which was subsequently retired by Bob Manfuso and Katy Voss.

"After [my husband] died, I sort of pined everything down and really just decided it was more fun for me to breed locally and have them run locally, then I could enjoy seeing them run," said Jackson. "Also, the breeder bonuses have been fantastic."

Barouchka is the dam of five foals of racing age, all winners by Mid-Atlantic stallions, including multiple stakes placed Renaissance Rosie, a daughter of Jump Start who sold for \$35,000 as a yearling and went on to win 15 of 25 starts with earnings of \$372,819.

Despite selling for \$1,600 as a yearling in the 2016

Fasig-Tipton Midlantic fall yearling sale, Taco Supream has proven himself.

"We had been really interested in breeding the mare to El Padrino," Jackson said. "Everyone that year was so excited about California Chrome and the breeding was similar between the Pulpit and Not For Love crosses. We thought we'd just try it to see what would happen and it has turned out to be a good cross."

Jackson claimed back Taco Supream's half-sister Renaissance Rosie last November for \$25,000 and has bred her to Golden Lad for 2020. Two half-siblings are still racing: Donald Herrington's four-time winner Baltimore County, a 5-year-old gelding by Orientate and Jim Wolf's three-time winner Artful Splatter, a 3-year-old daughter of Bandbox.

Barouchka has a weanling filly by Great Notion this year. Jackson plans to sell her in next year's Fasig-Tipton Midlantic fall yearling sale. Barouchka is barren for 2020.

Bowsprit

Like the bow of a ship cuts through waves, Ted Mudge's homebred Bowsprit cut through the stretch to fight off Son of Aponi, in the \$60,000 Turf Starter Handicap by a neck.

The gelding's feat served as a proud moment for his breeder, who races under Silhouette LLC. A longtime supporter of the Maryland breeding program who spent years on the Maryland Million board, Mudge now resides in Pennsylvania.

"I love the Maryland Million and think it's a great idea," said Mudge. "The whole thing is just a terrific boost to the state breeding industry and I'm very fortunate that they've allowed registered Maryland-breds to run in some of these races."

At the 2011 Fasig-Tipton Midlantic December sale, Bowsprit's dam Sassy Number piqued Mudge's interest. Despite a short racing career with minimal success, the daughter of Include was out

of the Polish Numbers mare Star Number, bred by long-time successful breeder Bob Meyerhoff. Never raced, Star Number has produced 11 foals, with six winners from seven starters, including multiple stakes winner Hartigan, by Include, and the multiple stakes-winning son of Curlin, Struth.

"Her breeding obviously is sensational," said Mudge. "She's a Meyerhoff family horse, so for a small breeder like me, any time you can tap into a family like that your hopes go up."

From five foals, all by Maryland sires with the exception of Bowsprit, Sassy Number has produced four horses of racing age and two

winners. Bowsprit is by Mast Track, who stood five seasons at Frank Stronach's Adena Springs in Ontario. Mudge originally planned to breed to Adena Springs stallion Sligo Bay (Ire), but he was unavailable at the time.

Bowsprit is his dam's most successful progeny and highest earner, amassing \$115,210 with a record of 4-1-3 from 21 career starts. Aside from Madam Alex, the first foal and winner from Sassy Number who was claimed in her second career start for \$25,000, Mudge owns all of Bowsprit's half-siblings: Hot On Time, a 4-year-old unplaced son of Showing Up, and three colts by Anchor and Hope Farm's Imagining, including 2-year-

old Late Night Fantasy, a yearling and this year's weanling.

"[Sassy Number] was late this year, so we did not breed her back," said Mudge.

"She's had a couple by Imagining and she'll go back to him next year because I really like what's come out of that pairing."



WHAT IS MHBA'S PAC?

It is a **political action committee** formed by the Maryland Horse Breeders Association. Any administrative expense will be paid by the MHBA. Reports of PAC contributions must be filed with the State Board of Elections and are a matter of public record.

WHAT ARE THE LAWS GOVERNING CAMPAIGN CONTRIBUTIONS?

No corporation or individual may give more than \$6,000 to a single candidate or PAC in any given four-year election cycle.

WHAT IS THE TAX STATUS OF MY CONTRIBUTION?

Contributions to the MHBA PAC are not deductible under state or federal law.

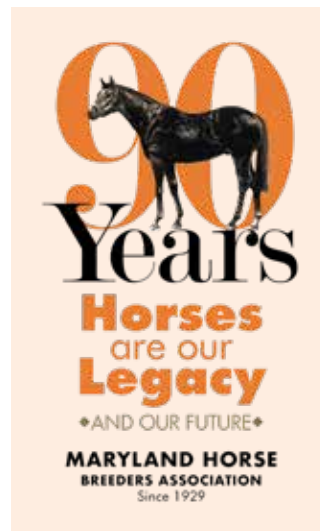

Maryland Report of Mares Bred in 2019

Maryland ranks sixth among states and provinces for the 2019 breeding season, with 780 mares reported bred to 31 stallions, based on The Jockey Club's Report of Mares Bred statistics received through Oct. 16. The average book of 25.2 mares per Maryland stallion is second only to Kentucky (77.8).

The busiest four stallions in Maryland stood at Northview Stallion Station, in Chesapeake City: Golden Lad with 89, first-year stallion Irish War Cry (83), Maryland's leading sire Great Notion (76) and Madefromlucky (58), with Anchor and Hope Farm's Imagining (48) fifth.

The Jockey Club has received reports for 1,134 stallions, who covered 29,218 mares in North America during 2019. The number of stallions declined 6.6 percent nationally from the 1,214 at this time in 2018, and the number of mares bred decreased 3.5 percent from the 30,274 reported last year.

The Jockey Club estimates that an additional 2,500 to 3,500 mares will be reported as bred during the 2019 season.

Statistics for all reported stallions in 2019 are available through the Fact Book section of jockeyclub.com.

Maryland-bred racemares bring six figures at Fasig-Tipton Kentucky November Sale

Maryland Million Ladies winner Zonda and multiple stakes winner Enchanted Ghost, entered as racing or broodmare prospects, were the highest-priced Maryland-breds of four sold at Fasig-Tipton's November Sale Nov. 5 in Lexington, Ky.

The most expensive, at \$500,000, was Zonda, purchased by Live Oak Stud. Breaking her maiden in her career debut in May, the 3-year-old filly finished fourth in the Christiana Stakes and Fasig-Tipton Virginia Oaks, fifth in the Light Hearted

Stakes and Bald Eagle Derby, and won an allowance in August. In her most recent start she drew off in the \$125,000 Maryland Million Ladies Oct. 19. Campaigned by Matt Schera, who plucked her out of the Fasig-Tipton Saratoga select yearling sale for \$155,000, Zonda has a record of 8-3-1-0, with \$159,407 in earnings.

Bred by Caroline Stautberg's Willow Oaks Stable, Zonda is one of five winners from her dam Winning Season, a daughter of the multiple graded stakes winner Topi-

count. She was consigned by South Point Sales Agency.

Ghostzapper's 4-year-old daughter Enchanted Ghost, consigned by Taylor Made Sales Agency, was purchased by Double Bridges for \$335,000. Racing for Mens Grille Racing after being selected out of the Fasig-Tipton Midlantic fall yearling sale for \$75,000, Enchanted Ghost broke her maiden in her fourth start at 2, was third in her stakes debut in her first start at 3 in the Marshua Stakes, and followed up with wins in the 2018 Wide Country Stakes and

this year's Maryland Racing Media Stakes. Having last raced in June, Enchanted Ghost earned \$262,182, with four wins in 17 starts.

Bred by George Louis Doetsch Jr., Enchanted Ghost is one of two winners for her dam, the Grand Slam mare Uniformly Yours. The mare's other runner is 2-year-old filly Selflessly, winner of the Miss Grillo-G2 at Belmont in September and a recent fifth in the Breeders' Cup Juvenile Fillies Turf-G1. 🐾

Yearling Show graduates Sharing, Project Whiskey shine on big stages

The Maryland Horse Breeders Association's annual yearling show has served as a stepping stone to success for many Maryland-breds since it was first held in 1932, and the crop of participants in last year's show was no exception, as two 2-year-olds racing this year found stakes victories within days.

Sharing, a filly by Speightstown and Breeders' Cup Filly and Mare Turf-G1 winner Shared Account, faced graded stakes company for the first time in the Breeders' Cup Juvenile Fillies Turf-G1 at Santa Anita Nov. 1. Sharing outshined the competition to win the mile on the turf by 1¼ lengths for Eclipse Thoroughbred Partners and Gainesway Stable and trainer Graham Motion, who also trained her dam. Bred by Sagamore Farm, Sharing improved to 3-0-1 in four starts and increased her earnings to \$730,300.

On the East Coast, Project Whiskey made her stakes debut in the Parx Juvenile Fillies at Parx Racing Nov. 4, battling down the stretch to win the 7

furlongs by three-quarters of a length. Owned by Cash is King and LC Racing and trained by Butch Reid, the filly by Tapizar out of Over the Moon has finished no worse than third in four starts, with two wins and two thirds. The Dark Hollow Farm-bred earned \$106,800.

Before they were excelling on the racetrack, they participated in Class IV of last year's MHBA Yearling Show, for fillies bred in Maryland by out-of-state sires. Judged by the late Rick Violette, both made the final cut, with Project Whiskey taking the blue ribbon as Violette admired the quality of her hip, shoulder and hind leg. Despite not placing, Sharing was not left without praise, as Violette noted she had a "good walk, with a very good hip and shoulder."

Following the yearling show, Sharing went on to the Fasig-Tipton Saratoga select sale, where she sold for \$350,000 to Eclipse. Project Whiskey was entered in the Fasig-Tipton Midlantic fall yearling sale, where she was

purchased for \$35,000 by Chuck Zacney of Cash is King.

Many horses have stepped out of the yearling show to successful racing or breeding careers, regardless of the ribbons they did or did not receive, including: Safely Kept, overlooked in the ring in 1987 as one of 60 fillies in her class, she went on to become a National Racing Hall of Fame Member, earning \$2 million and winning the Breeders' Cup Sprint-G1, along with receiving an Eclipse Award as the nation's champion sprinter; Smart Angle, who finished fifth in her class but was nearly unbeatable the next year on the track, winning three Grade 1 stakes and being named the nation's champion 2-year-old filly; Cathryn Sophia, second in her class in 2014, who earned more than \$1 million and was never off the board in her nine starts, highlighted by a Grade 1 win in the Kentucky Oaks, and earning titles as 2016 Maryland-bred champion sprinter, champion 3-year-old filly and Horse of the Year; Declan's Moon, winner of

Class I in 2003, who won all four starts at 2 and won the 2004 Eclipse Award as 2-year-old male as well as Maryland-bred Horse of the Year, and 2005 Maryland-bred champion 3-year-old.

Every yearling shown, regardless of placing, is eligible for the \$40,000 MHBA Yearling Show Premium Award, split and distributed twice: \$20,000 among the exhibitors of four show contestants who earn the most money as 2-year-olds and another \$20,000 among the exhibitors of the four highest-earning 3-year-old runners the following year.

After her Breeders' Cup victory, Sharing has earned the premium award for her exhibitor, Sagamore Farm, as she is the top-earning 2-year-old from her show year and the highest-earning 2-year-old since the premiums were established in 1983, surpassing Declan's Moon, who amassed \$507,300 in 2004. 🐾



MARYLAND-BRED STAKES WINNERS

Project Whiskey prevails in Parx Juvenile Fillies

Cash is King and LC Racing's Project Whiskey fended off late challenger Fly On Angel to win the \$75,000 Parx Juvenile Fillies Stakes at Parx Racetrack Nov. 4.

Making her stakes debut, Project Whiskey settled into third, stalking pacesetter Capital Q through an opening quarter in :22.69. Project Whiskey joined Lula's Roadrunner

and Capital Q through a half-mile in :45.66, and on the far turn charged for the lead. She put away the early leaders, then repulsed Fly On Angel down the stretch to prevail by three-quarters of a length after 7 furlongs in 1:25.16.

The Butch Reid trainee improved to 2-0-2 from four starts to boost her earnings to \$106,800. In her first two starts at Saratoga in July, Project Whiskey finished third twice. She broke through with a win at her home base at Parx in September, romping by 5½ lengths going 7 furlongs.

The daughter of Tapizar was bred by David and JoAnn Hayden's Dark Hollow Farm, which also bred her dam Over the Moon, a winning daughter of Malibu Moon out of Clever Phase. Project Whiskey is Over the Moon's sec-

ond named foal, and first winner. The mare hasn't had a foal the past two years and was bred to Irish War Cry for 2020.

Regular participants in Maryland Horse Breeders Association yearling shows, the Haydens took home a first-place ribbon with Project Whiskey in 2018, in the class for Maryland-bred fillies by out-of-state sires. Among those in the class was Sharing, winner of the Breeders' Cup Juvenile Fillies Turf-G1 three days before Project Whiskey's stakes score.

Project Whiskey was assigned by Dark Hollow to the 2018 Fasig-Tipton Midlantic Eastern Fall Yearling sale, where she was purchased by Cash is King's Chuck Zacney for \$35,000.
