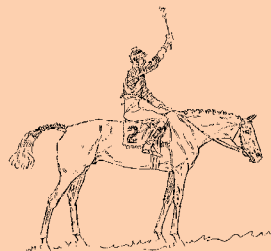

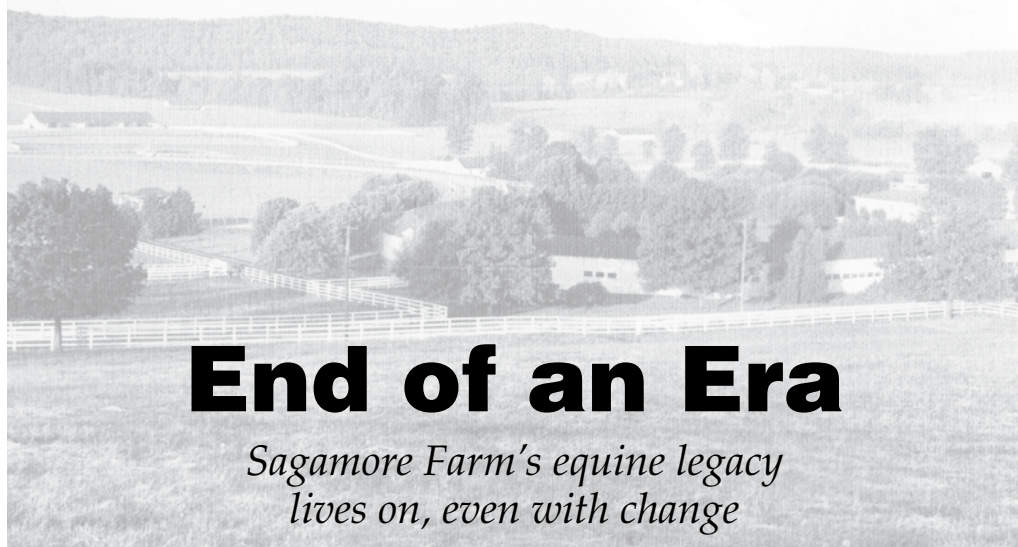

End of an Era

Sagamore Farm's equine legacy lives on, even with change

On Nov. 5, 2010, just three years after Kevin Plank purchased and restored Sagamore Farm in Reisterstown, Shared Account swept across the finish line to win by a neck in the Breeders' Cup Filly and Mare Turf-G1 at 46-1, with Edgar Prado sporting Sagamore's redesigned three-diamond maroon and black silks.

Ten years later, Sagamore and WinStar Farm's Woodward Handicap-G1 winner Global Campaign finished third in the 2020 Breeders' Cup Classic-G1. It was the colt's last start before retiring to stud duty at WinStar, but also the end of a 14-year chapter as Plank announced Sagamore would move out of breeding and racing and focus on the Sagamore Spirit venture.

The historic farm has served a variety of purposes, starting out as fields of alfalfa before Isaac Emerson, inven-

tor of Bromo-Seltzer, turned it into a horse farm for his daughter Margaret in 1925. Margaret gave the farm to her son, Alfred G. Vanderbilt Jr., when he turned 21 in 1933. Vanderbilt turned Sagamore into a landmark as a premier breeding and training facility, starting with the colt Discovery, who later sired the mare Geisha, who produced the great Native Dancer, and the rest was history.

But over time Vanderbilt's operation shrunk, and the farm was sold to developer James Ward in 1986. Grandeur turned to dilapidation until Plank, founder of Under Armour, purchased the property in 2007.

Despite his new focus, the 530-acre facility will remain as it stands, though some of the pastures will be converted and used to grow corn and rye for the whiskey brand. The springhouse, built in 1909,

supplies the water Sagamore Spirit's Baltimore distillery uses to proof rye whiskey.

Though there will no longer be racehorses on the Tapeeta track, or broodmares filling stalls as they wait to foal, a small herd of retired horses will call the farm home. The Sagamore Farm team will also remain to care for the horses, keep the legacy of Plank's Sagamore Racing alive and continue sharing the farm's history.

The property is much quieter these days, and a couple of the barns completely empty, but the work hasn't subsided for Debbie Moorefield, Jocelyn Brooks and the rest of the Sagamore staff.

Debbie

Moorefield has spent almost half of her life working at Sagamore Farm, full-time and part-time during the Vanderbilt era and for Plank, and

2 this will be the first year she won't have pregnant broodmares to foal out.

"I'm always going to miss having mares and having babies, but you know, never say never," said Moorefield. "[Plank] said that, so it's OK."

The Pennsylvania native grew up showing, eventing and participating in Pony Club, while going to the racetrack with her father to watch his horses at Charles Town and Shenandoah Downs. "I got in trouble at Charles Town for galloping the pony on the backside," she recalled with a laugh.

By her 20s, Moorefield was trudging along in a full-time job at her local township water and sewer office, though the idea of working in the Thoroughbred industry piqued her interest. She aimed high, and left her information with Sagamore, Windfields in Chesapeake City and Glade Valley in Frederick.

A few weeks later, a late night out with a friend led to Moorefield calling in sick to work the next day, something she'd never done, and

at 10 o'clock that morning her phone rang. Harold Ferguson, Sagamore's general manager, was on the line.

"I think about that all the time because if I'd gone to work that day, [since] we didn't have answering ma-

chines, nobody would have answered the phone and he would've called somebody else," said Moorefield. "That Saturday I came down here and met with him, said I would start in two weeks, went back and gave two

weeks' notice, then packed my bags and moved to Sagamore. It was in March of 1980 and I came and worked in this barn."

After four years as a groom, assisting in the breeding shed and helping the veterinarian, she moved to Tim and Nina Gardner's Welcome Here Farm down the road, and served as the farm manager for 16 years. When they moved to Pennsylvania, Moorefield remained for a year before returning to Maryland and handling the books for a restaurant, while also working for Rick Abbott and his Charlton Bloodstock at the sales.

In 2004, Abbott hired her as his administrative assistant. Handling the office, working at sales and helping foal watch on the farm, she acquired a new set of skills under the guidance of Abbott and his wife Dixie. But once Abbott decided to retire and sell the farm, Moorefield sought out something familiar.

She had met then Sagamore general manager Tom Mullikin at a sale, was doing some foal watching at the farm and it was only natural to ask about a job.

"You have a full-time job here whenever you want it," Mullikin told Moorefield.

She felt like a newcomer.

"I hadn't worked in a barn in 15 years when I came here, and I wasn't crazy about going back to the barn. I was so out of shape," she said. "The first week I was here, Quoth the Raven knocked me down and drug me across the pea gravel, ripped my jeans from like my thigh to my ankle. I said, 'Oh my God . . . I'm too old to do this.' But you know I lost a couple pounds, got fit again, and I love doing this."

Returning full-time to Sagamore in 2013 as broodmare manager, she has overseen the births of some 60 foals, highlighted by Shared Account's daughter Sharing, winner of the 2019 Breeders' Cup Juvenile Fillies Turf-G1.

Moorefield spent every day with Sharing as they prepared for the 2018 Maryland Horse Breeders Association yearling show, and later the Fasig-Tipton Saratoga select sale. If the paddocks and barn aisle could talk, they'd have plenty of stories of the time Moorefield spent marching Sharing around. Like a doting mother, Moorefield over-analyzed every detail, as she did with every other horse, fed her extra, kept her in on the rainy days, and remedied every blemish she could.

And when the two reunited last year at Fair Hill Training Center, just before Sharing headed off to Royal Ascot to run in the Coronation Stakes-G1 (she finished second), it was as if no time had passed.

"I cried. That was a big deal that day. My heart rate must have been through the roof," she said. "When we walked down there, as she came off the racetrack, I swear to God she looked right at me and took a couple of steps off of the path. I cried."

Brooks backed up her co-worker.

"She took a few steps toward us, and I said, 'We'll call this her Black Beauty moment.' She just sort of veered toward us like, 'Oh hi, I know who they are.' It was really, really cool. I give myself chills just talking about it. It was special."

Harpers First Ride, winner of last year's Pimlico Special-G3, multiple graded stakes winner Blamed, stakes winner Ginger N Rye and \$245,939-earner Bring Me Answers are just a handful of spe-

Sagamore Lineup

Sagamore Farm's roster of retirees keeps horse tradition alive, under the guidance of Debbie Moorefield and Jocelyn Brooks.

Chase Greatness: The homebred by More Than Ready out of Salsa Star won once as a 2-year-old in 2018 before he fractured his right front sesamoid and ended his racing career. Though the prognosis was grim, and surgery wasn't an option, he went back to the farm and recovered. After dealing with laminitis in his left front leg and slow healing in the other, Chase Greatness transitioned stall rest to hand-walking to turnout in the round pen. The lifelong resident lives out with his friend One Ninety Nine and enjoys a pampered life. Watching him gallop around the field still amazes the staff.

Create Fearlessly: The first foal of Sagamore's homebred graded stakes winner Daring Dancer is a 5-year-old son of Uncle Mo who never raced. He'd been in training, but a variety of lameness issues always kept him out of the starting gate. While the team hoped he'd get another chance, he'll enjoy his downtime on the farm and potentially be up for adoption as a riding horse.

Crooked Bridge: An unraced homebred by Verrazano out of Naive Enough, the 5-year-old mare is fondly known as the "very crooked, honoree retired broodmare." Though she was never bred, she lives with Sagamore's two retired broodmares Dictate the Tempo and Tizthen. Previously used in EquiTeam's equine-assisted psychotherapy program at the Baltimore County Agriculture Center in Cockeysville, Md., Crooked Bridge will live out her days on the farm unless there's an opportunity for her to be a pasture pet or do therapy again.

Daring Dancer '18: A younger half-brother of Create Fearlessly, the 3-year-old homebred colt is an unraced son of Kitten's Joy who suffered a career-ending injury before he could make his debut. His claim to fame was winning The Equiery magazine's foal photo contest in 2018, with the August issue featuring a photo of him as a foal on the cover as he peeked through the farm's iconic white fence. "He's been here six months and he's got to stay in the stall another six probably, but hopefully he will be able to be ridden and should be fine," said Moorefield.

Dictate the Tempo: Purchased for \$330,000 as a yearling, the daughter of Dixie Union and Rosthern made six starts between 2009 and 2011 and won once before retiring to life as a broodmare. Of six foals, she produced two winners: Do You Like That (Flower Alley) and Knockout Punch (First Defence). The 14-year-old had her last foal in 2018, a filly by Daredevil, who has yet to start.

Go Hard: A stoic chestnut with a kind eye, the 7-year-old son of Candy Ride (Arg) and Understated was purchased for \$150,000 as a yearling, but struggled with balance issues while in training, which prevented him from making it to the races. "We think it's something neurologic, it's in the back-end," said Brooks. "He has really good days and he has some days that aren't as good. It's not dramatic, obviously, but they never could give us a definitive diagnosis and they kind of said just go on with him." The gelding was part of the Saratoga WarHorse program, a veteran-run, nonprofit at the Baltimore County Ag Center that serves military veterans and service members living with post-traumatic stress, for nearly a year. He returned to Sagamore once the round pen work became too much for him.

Mildlyoutofcontrol: An unraced 8-year-old homebred by Uncle Mo out of Tizthen, is part of a three-gelding herd known by the staff as "The Three Stooges." Pasture mate **Possibly Terrific**, a one-time starter purchased for \$90,000 as a yearling, will join the Saratoga

WarHorse program in the spring. The 7-year-old gelding is a son of Flatter out of Carolina Light. Rounding out the trio is **Youngin' Fearless**, a 6-year-old gelding by Flatter out of Madoffwiththecash, who made his debut in October 2018 but was pulled up in his second start. The \$210,000 yearling purchase has recovered from a bowed tendon in his left front and is ready to be restarted under saddle for his new career.

One Ninety Nine: Standing just under 17 hands, the 6-year-old gelding by Violence out of Lady Zeva ironically lives as low man on the totem pole in the pasture he shares with the smaller Create Fearlessly. Purchased for \$310,000 as a 2-year-old, he bowed a tendon before he could start but should have no limitations. "He's kind of grumpy, but he won't attack you," said Brooks. "And he's beautiful obviously."

Rickhouse: Making 22 starts between 2017 and 2020, the gelding by Colonel John out of Lucky Lady retired with two wins and two thirds. Sold to Sagamore for \$160,000 as a 2-year-old, he's ready for a new home with the right person.

Thousandyardstare: Sagamore purchased Evening Sky (Jpn), pregnant with Thousandyardstare (Empire Maker), for \$335,000 at the 2015 January Keeneland sale. Born in Kentucky right after the sale, the homebred made one start last year and earned \$300. "He ran in the same race Camp Randall won, they ran as an entry, and this one fell to his face coming out of the gate, trailed his field, made a little run and beat a couple horses and then Covid-19 hit. He was sound, but he wasn't moving well, so they brought him home," said Moorefield. The team thinks he'd excel over cross country, or really anything someone trained him to do, based on his easy way of going and ability to "float over the ground."

Tizthen: The stakes-placed daughter of Tiznow produced seven foals for Sagamore, including Mildlyoutofcontrol. Stakes-placed Tizgale (Stormy Atlantic) and Global Citizen (To Honor and Serve) are two of her five winning starters. She produced her last foal in 2017, a filly by Friesan Fire, who sold for \$9,000 at the 2020 Fasig-Tipton December mixed sale. Sagamore will be 17-year-old Tizthen's forever home.

Norm: The farm's retired teaser rounds out the resident roster. Though he lives in a paddock by himself, he enjoys the company of the three retired broodmares across the driveway.

Since visiting the farm mid-January, two of Sagamore's retired racehorses were rehomed. **Camp Randall** (Shackleford) made his final start last March, had spent most of his time at the farm last year and returned as a retiree in December. The \$240,000 yearling purchase won twice from four starts and will take on a new career as a show horse. **Fork Union** (Lea) was purchased for \$200,000 as a yearling and failed to break his maiden in four starts. Making his final start last May, the 4-year-old will try foxhunting in his new home.

Hercules was the exception to the Thoroughbred-only 'rule'. The white draft horse served as a member of Baltimore Police Department's Mounted Unit before retiring to Sagamore in 2018. The first horse Moorefield would check on in the morning, Hercules had a statuesque presence, a handsomely long forelock, and towered over the classic four-board white fence as a neighbor of "The Three Stooges." The farm's beloved ambassador died Feb. 20 after a long battle due to complications from melanoma. He will be buried on the farm.

cial horses Moorefield foaled and raised.

"I never had kids, but I can't imagine being any more proud of a son or daughter," said Moorefield. "The night Sharing won the Breeders' Cup, I was crying—my husband thought I was going to hurt myself, and then I was trying to call [Jocelyn], she was trying to call me."

Well versed in all aspects of the Thoroughbred industry, Moorefield understands better than anyone that change is a given. But there are still horses

on the farm, which means she still has a job.

"We're busy, we're busy all day," she said. "And we take care of all of them like they're worth a million dollars and we do things right."

Though a small herd of retirees may seem like child's play when compared to a farm filled with weanlings, yearlings, broodmares and young racehorses, the group keeps the staff plenty occupied. The numbers changed, but Moorefield's commitment never wavers. She'll continue to take

care of the horses, alongside grooms Alfredo Martinez, Jose Vega and Quezada Valente.

"The fact that the whole team, we're all still here, means a lot. And we really are a team," said Moorefield. "[Sagamore has] been such a big part of my life. Meeting my husband here, the fact that we've been able to make a marriage work for 36 years, and I've spent more than half my life here, or half of it. I've learned how to be a good human being, not just somebody that's good with horses."

Jocelyn

For nearly five years, Brooks asked to be a hotwalker for one of Sagamore's horses on a race day. She'd been turned down, until last year, when the Covid-19 pandemic increased restrictions at the tracks, and limited available personnel. She finally got her chance to travel with Global Campaign, heading to Saratoga for the Woodward-G1 and Keeneland for the Breeders' Cup Classic-G1.

Beside the colt in the winner's circle after the Woodward, Sagamore's chief of staff managed to plant a kiss on his sweaty forehead. The sentiment was just a tiny reflection of Brooks' devotion to Sagamore's horses and people.

"I used to go to literally every race at Laurel, unless there was some circumstance I couldn't get there, I'd go to all of them. I loved seeing them run, I loved seeing our barn team. When we had a string at Laurel, I would go there at least one morning a week," said Brooks. "I miss racing because I still would probably go and see some of our horses, even though they aren't with us, but we can't go now."

Born in New York, Brooks grew up in Towson, Md., and picked up riding at a young age. Her love of horses stuck with her as she earned a bachelor's degree in public relations, marketing and sports marketing at Towson University and later worked in event planning. After spending time handling marketing and client relations at the Pet+ER emergency veterinary facility in Towson, Brooks stumbled upon an opening at Under Armour and reached out to a friend who worked there.

"She said, 'I don't think you'd love that one but if something cool pops up I'll let you know,'" Brooks said. "That same day she said, 'You're never going to believe this. They're looking for someone at the farm to support the new president and I thought of you right away.'"

Brooks joined Sagamore Racing full-time in 2015. Her title encompassed a wide

range of responsibilities, which only increased as she learned more about the industry, though her main purpose was to support farm president Hunter Rankin and the rest of the team. Whether it was handling issues at the farm, attending sales, traveling to races, sitting in on breeding meetings or overseeing events and tours at the farm, Brooks has had a hand in it, all the while absorbing the history of the farm and Plank's contributions to it.

And by the way her eyes light up, anyone can tell how important the experience has been.

"I had never been around babies and yearlings and I think that was a really special thing, to get to know a horse from baby through racehorse, so that first for me was really, really incredible. And it's just something I never knew I'd get to be a part of," said Brooks. "Like I can't believe I'm drying off a baby horse and now it's a racehorse. It seems so small, and you get to see them every day and watch them grow up and see their personalities, so that part's been really, really cool."

Graded stakes winner Recruiting Ready, purchased

by Sagamore as a 2-year-old, holds a special place.

"We named him Recruiting Ready because it was a mantra of the farm, [for] the grounds team. We wanted the farm to be recruiting ready, like no matter who's showing up today, we don't know who it's going to be, the farm was going to be recruiting ready. The grounds team all has shirts that say 'Recruiting Ready,' so his first race the whole team came," said Brooks. "He was just very special to the farm and he had the coolest personality, so he is just one who was really special."

Recruiting Ready sits just below Shared Account and Global Campaign on Sagamore Farm's list of earners with \$823,189 after winning or placing in 13 stakes, six graded. No win stands out more than the 2017 Chick Lang at Pimlico on Preakness Day, as Plank hosted his party in the Under Armour tent on the infield.

"I still have his glue-on shoe on my desk, and if you watch that replay you can see [jockey Horacio] Karamanos point at the Under Armour tent as he goes by the finish line, and we're all screaming and hollering," said Brooks. "To us, to give Kevin a win on

that big day and for this horse that's so special to do it, I have never gotten over it. We all want the horses to run well for him and to make him proud, and to win a stake on Preakness Day, it doesn't get much better than that."

Any conversation about Sagamore greats starts with Sharing and her dam, but the former's older sister Riley's Choice, a stakes-winning homebred by Distorted Humor, stands out too. Other memories traced back to various Maryland Pride Days at Laurel, where homebreds Ginger N Rye and De Marquee each won a race in 2015 and Where Paradise Lay, a son of homebred Walkwithapurpose, won the Star de Naska Stakes in 2019.

Over the past few years things changed as Sagamore downsized, with horses sold, retired or claimed away. And when Plank announced the change, the staff was shocked, but ultimately understood.

"I was obviously super sad to lose the horses, not that any were going somewhere bad, but you love them, they're your kids," said Brooks. "I think a lot of people, they've been in this business long enough that they've seen it happen a lot, and it's not un-

common at all. So not that it doesn't hurt, but they know this is how it works. One day you have the horses, and then you don't.

"Everyone completely understood, and knew from the beginning that everything's going to be fine, but it just took a minute to get over the initial [shock]. I love racing, we all do, but that's a good thing that you love it so much that it's hard to imagine a life without it I guess."

The team finds solace in being able to stay on and be a part of the community, while also following their foals for years to come. Brooks knows her role will change, but she continues to share life on the farm with fans through social media while focusing on the horses, particularly those that have the chance to be rehomed.

Through its Next Move program, Sagamore works to determine the next steps for retirees. Those able to go on to new careers are given downtime before being retrained and rehomed, or they're adopted out without post-track training to qualified owners as candidates for the Retired Racehorse Project's Thoroughbred Makeover. Some aren't sound enough or have other

limitations that prevent them from riding careers, so they'll spend the rest of their lives on the farm or be rehomed as pets/companions.

Nuno Santos, an exercise rider turned off-track Thoroughbred trainer, retrains Sagamore's horses and helps find them homes. Perpetual Optimism, purchased for \$130,000 as a 2-year-old, went through the Next Move program in 2016 and was adopted by Brooks in 2017. The 9-year-old First Defence gelding failed to win his five starts on the track, but enjoys his new career as an eventer.

"It's a beautiful horse farm, with beautiful pasture, and great people and great facilities and I think it's important that it has horses. I think [Sagamore] Spirit is going to be using this farm a lot and I think the horse part of our story is so important," said Brooks. "Kevin wants there to be life on the farm, he wants there to be horses and cats and people, that's what it should be, it shouldn't just be empty. He wants it to have a heartbeat and have activity. Some of these horses are so good, so hopefully when things are back to normal, people will be desperate to get out and this can be a getaway, which is what it should be."

Hunter

When Rankin talks about his time overseeing the Plank's breeding and racing operation, the conversation always leads to his team of employees.

"One great thing about when I came here was that we had a really, really good team of people already, so I didn't have to make any changes in that. The nucleus of people was here, the buy-in from the team was here, and they were a very dedicated group of people. Most of the people that were here when I got here are still here," said Rankin. "I'd probably be most proud that, our team did this and accom-

plished what we accomplished, together. It made the wins more special and it made the losses harder, because you win or lose together."

For the team's leader, the opportunity revealed itself in a time when he needed it.

Though he grew up on his parents' Upson Downs Farm in Goshen, Ky., and spent years going to Churchill Downs, Rankin turned away from his roots in the Thoroughbred industry as he received a degree in journalism and public relations at the University of North Carolina and later worked for an insurance company.

The sudden death of his brother in 2012 prompted self-reflection and change, inspiring Rankin to reach out to Plank, who later recruited him to work at his real estate company Sagamore Development. But a year and a half later, the Thoroughbred industry called him back.

"It was actually not an easy decision. Though I still loved the Thoroughbred industry and all of that, I didn't really know what I was going to do. But I ended up taking it. I've been here for five and a half years I guess and it's been the greatest professional time of my life," said Rankin. "To be responsible for a brand in horse racing that is so important and so special in history, and then trying to build on that history and trying to build something of our own, it was just an awesome experience. Working for Kevin, who has been not only a great friend but a great boss and a great mentor, it's truly been the best time of my life."

Rankin recruited veteran trainer Stanley Hough as an advisor and racing manager, along with his assistant Laz Cruz, while also working with Maryland-based trainer Horacio DePaz.

The team campaigned South Bend, purchased for \$70,000 as a 2-year-old, who won the 2019 Street Sense Stakes and placed in three others as he earned

\$325,114. He Hate Me won the 2017 Tremont Stakes and earned \$323,185. Other notables included stakes-placed homebreds All I Karabout and Chubby Star.

Sagamore saved one of the best for last. Purchased for \$250,000 as a yearling and owned in partnership with WinStar, Global Campaign earned \$1,321,080 as he won the Woodward, Monmouth Cup-G3 and Peter Pan-G3 while placing in the Breeders' Cup Classic and Jim Dandy-G2. He retired with six wins from 10 starts in 2019 and 2020.

"The Woodward was really, really special. Winning a race like that, when you go through the history of that race and who won it over time, it's a really important and special race," said Rankin. "You fall in love with [the horses] for different reasons obviously—him it was just his supreme talent."

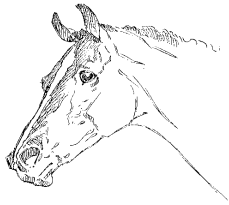
Back in Maryland, Plank, Rankin and the rest of the team are trying to sort out the future for the farm, outside of serving as a resource for Sagamore Spirit. The barns and training track will remain untouched, as will a majority of the property, though some of the original fencing will be taken down and stored as land is prepped and converted to grow crops. The farm's maintenance crew will continue working to keep the property in shape.

"The horses aren't going away. Maybe down the road we'll figure out a use for the racetrack too, but it's going to be there, it's a part of this farm. I know Kevin looks at it that way," said Rankin. "We still want to make sure the community has access to this place. It's such a landmark in the state of Maryland and a landmark especially for the local community, so I know Kevin wants to make sure that the people can see it, be a part of it, so we're looking at those ideas."

"We don't have anything totally ironed out yet, but we've done tours in the past and things like that. Obviously they'll be different without racehorses here but we're looking at a lot of different things to make sure it's still special."

The end of Sagamore's breeding and racing operation also meant the end of Rankin's journey, though he plans to stay connected with Plank. Churchill Downs Incorporated announced that he had been hired as the senior director of racing for them in late February.

"The next chapter of Sagamore is going to be this, but this place has had many chapters and there will be more beyond it, so you never know what will happen down the road," said Rankin. "We have no plans to [race again] currently but I hope that the last chapter of Sagamore Racing has not been written." 🐾
